MESSAGE TO THE ALUMNI FROM DR. J. R. C. EVANS.

As members of the Alumni Association we all will be keenly interested in learning of the denominational effort now being made from coast to coast in the interests of our Alma Mater.

Ever since the financial crash of 1929 educational institutions almost everywhere have been finding it increasingly difficult to carry on their work due to the shrinkage in operating revenues and in the tremendous reduction in general support. In this regard Brandon College has been no exception. Her struggle for existence, which ever was vigorous, has been so intensified during the recent past by the continued depression that it is a wonder she has been able to keep alive.

The glaring impossibility of her situation was clearly faced by the College Board last June. The picture was indeed dark at that time. Fortunately, however, just as the night seemed darkest, a ray of light came over the horizon in the form. of a message from denominational interests in the East asking for the opportunity to discuss the Brandon College situation in the hope of finding some way of tiding over these financially difficult days.

The result of careful deliberation and frank discussion led to a united effort of the Conventions of Ontario and Quebec with those of the four Western provinces in the interests of Brandon College. The campaign which is now under way will close on the 26th of this month, and it is sincerely hoped and really expected that the outcome of this combined effort will enable the College to meet the needs of the present year and at the same time open the way for 1934-35. The success of the project, however, will require the very best effort on the part of all who are interested in the welfare of Brandon College.

For the vital interest in our Alma Mater taken by our eastern friends, we as members of the Alumni Association are exceedingly grateful. To them, and to all who are so nobly sacrificing to keep the doors of Brandon College open in order that the good work may continue, we extend our sincere appreciation.

FACULTY NOTES

The College welcomes to the chair of history, Frof. R. MacGregor Fraser, M.A. B.D. Mr. Fraser takes the place of Frof. J. Norrie Anderson who accepted a call to a church in Halifax. Mr. Fraser comes with a fine scholastic record behind him. He has taken post-graduate work in history in principal Universities in Canada, England and Germany and has recently completed the major part of his work for his Ph. D. at Yale University He calls McMaster University his Alma Mater. He became favorably known to many Western Canadians some years ago when he was pastor of Fairview Baptist Church, Vancouver.

And the same reception had greeted it previously in New York, with Eva la Gallienne and Philip Merivale. Who the Brandon stars are, we do not know at the moment, but it is to be given at the end of November. The scene of the play is in the Castle of Princess Beatrice, in a far-away mythical kingdom, somewhere in Europe. The story, which suggests much of the charm of the popular "Student Prince" and "Castles In The Air", is that of an ambitious scheming mother, the result of whose plans for her beautiful daughter, Alexandra, just goes to show that after all, very often the "best laid plans of mice and men gang aft agley."
