FROM OUR MAIL BAG

In our bulletin last spring we asked those of our number overseas to send us some of their impressions of life "over there." We are grateful to those who have written to us and give you here a few excerpts.

May 1, 1943.

"I have been engaged in operational flying against the enemy for the past three months. Since I've been here one year that may sound strange to you. Practically all the other time has been spent in training. I am attached to Bomber Command and to turn out a bomber crew capable of handling the aircraft of today certainly requires plenty of time. A point worthy of note is that the allies can afford to take more time in training now. So I guess you might conclude that the Empire Training Plan is doing its job.

"At present we are stationed not too far from -- (censored). I've spent two days at this town and enjoyed myself very much. It certainly is a university town all right and I saw many a gown. The buildings are no better than Brandon College, but of course the grounds are in a class by themselves. Punting on the river proved to be "quite the thing to do - old boy." Was fun too.

"England took quite a bit of getting used to as it is very different from Canada in most

commercial respects. You don't just send your suit out to be cleaned. You take it yourself and hope you'll see it again in a couple of weeks. However, once you find out that everybody else is putting up with it too it's not so bad.

"We have had 17 successful sorties to date to all parts of Italy and Germany. The trip to Italy was made in perfect moonlight, so you can imagine what a magnificent picture the Alps afforded."

May 10, 1943.

"Regarding interesting experiences, I hardly know where to start. Nights in London during the blitz were the most interesting of all - seeing the calmness of the British civilian - men and woman - during most trying times. The courage displayed in rescue work and above all the way they carried on their work the morning after, working at their desks in buildings with the fronts blown off, windows out and on one occasion on the sidewalks outside.

"My leaves I have spent in wandering in quaint old villages in Cornwall, Devon, in London, Scotland and Northern Ireland. In each place there is an old world charm and beauty - too often marred by the products of modern civilization."

21st April, 1943.

"I imagine you are rather interested in what goes on over here. There is so much and yet so little to tell. Everywhere one goes you come in contact with some battleground, building, or landmark associated with great changes, not only in English History, but world history. To those interested in such things, realms may be written. To those interested in what we in the army are doing, one word will suffice - training.

"Highlights of my stay over here -

Sept. '40 First real blitz on London. The night the docks were hit it looked as though the cauldron of hell had the lid off.

Oct. '40 My first trip to London - a grand experience. The highlight of it was a trip to Westminster Abbey which had been bombed. An old chap about 75 was showing us around. He loved the Abbey and he loved London. He was very bitter against a paper hanger from Austria daring to bomb the Abbey and I thought his final comment was priceless. - "Even in the last war the Kaiser wouldn't have dared do such a thing, but even if he had he was at least somebody."

July '41 Spent a week with the Royal Navy. Never met a finer bunch of chaps collectively.

MARRIAGES

Impressions formed are:

1. People who can stand up to the blitz on London and other cities the way the people did cannot be beaten.
2. The women are doing a grand job.
3. The English people are most hospitable.
4. The Englishman may be leisurely but he is not slow.
5. No grumbles despite heavy taxes, shortages of many things that we once considered essential, and watered beer.
6. Canada's war effort is magnificent but its extent is not fully appreciated by the majority over here due to lack of publicity.

September 3, 1943.

"I have just come back from a very interesting and enjoyable 7 day leave at Oxford University. Balliol College is running a continuous weekly course now for Canadians and Americans on leave. British officers were sent, as a duty, to provide the British touch. Naturally they enjoyed it just as much as we did. The idea originated with the Canadian Legion, but now Balliol has taken it over, pretty much as an alternative to having their buildings requisitioned by the government.

"The general scheme was: two lectures every morning with plenty of time for discussion, organized tours in the afternoon, and entertainment in the evening. The lecturers included: The Master of Balliol, Prof. A. L. Goodhart, K.C. (formerly of Yale), Very Rev. John Lowe - Dean of Christ Church (formerly of Toronto), the Warden of Rhodes House, and Sir Edward Grigg, M.P. Their topics were of general interest, especially to Canadian and American visitors.

"We lived at Balliol and were able to use the Library there. Their Economics section follows the same general lines as Brandon's. The stained glass windows and ample space are quite an advantage though. They had Bladen's new text and the Essays that Innis edited, but both had been presented by Bladen and showed little signs of wear. We were shown through the Balliolian Library but the really valuable books have been removed for the duration. They have one copy of every book published in English, I believe the Librarian said. I noticed "Mickey Mouse" in the basement. Their new building is used for hospital work. It is of modern design and quite unpopular on that account."

At present we are in the grips of that chill November weather that betokens the fact that soon - all too soon - the "old lady will be plucking her geese" and the soil of Manitoba will be covered with the soft, though scarcely warm, down of winter.
