

## Prime Minister Visits College

History was made at Brandon College, when Prime Minister Louis St. Laurent took time out from his busy western tour to deliver a brief address in the college chapel on the morning of May 20. Despite the fact that final examinations were in progress a large body of students, faculty, and outside guests crowded the chapel to hear the Prime Minister speak.

### **Programme**

Members of the Brandon Alumni Association and all former students of Brandon College will be interested in the plans for the expansion of the college now underway.

At a dinner meeting of over one hundred representative citizens held in the lower auditorium of St. Paul's United Church on April 13th, a resolution was unanimously and enthusiastically passed authorizing a Five Hundred Thouand Dollar campaign and setting up an organization committee in connection with the same.

To be sure, this is a great undertaking; the greatest of its kind ever attempted in the history of Brandon College. The successful competion of it will require considerable time and much effort.

The objective is not only large; in addition it is most significant: in fact, it is because it is large that it is so significant, for when reached it will provide an auditorium and student centre, a library, a gymnasium, an addition to the Science Building and will make possible a renovation programme for our present buildings.

In the fall of 1949, Brandon College will enter upon her Fiftieth Anniversary year. You will be hearing more about this later, but in what way could we celebrate our Fiftieth Anniversary more effectively than by enthusiastically launching this campaign for expan-

sion?

Education is creative — growth is essential — expansion is a necessity.

After fifty years of colorful history, persistent in effort, courageous in spirit, rich in tradition, and significant in contribution, Brandon College now stands at the gateway to a great future. ## In Memoriam

#### TO PROF. A. H. FOSTER

The many graduates of Brandon College who have been associated with Professor A. H. Foster through the years since 1930 will learn with regret of his death on May 29, 1948. Professor Foster was born in Pictou, N.S. in 1871. He attended Pictou Academy. He held the Munro Bursary for two years at Dalhousie University from which institution he received his Master's Degree. He then attended Pine Hill Theological College where he recieved the B.D. Degree. In 1902 he married Elizabeth McDonald of Pictou, N.S. and moved to St. John, N.B. where

Rev. Foster came to Manitoba in 1918 and held congregations and taught school in this province for some time. He joined the staff of Brandon College in the fall of 1930 and since that time had served faithfully and well as Professor of Classics and Religious Studies.

## B. C. Students Win Medals at Convocation

It will be of general interest to the Alumni to know that the students of the Graduating Class of 1948 brought honor to our Alma Mater by winning top honors in their several fields not only in Brandon College, but in the University of Manitoba as a whole. The General Proficiency Medal was won by Garth Hollis Markle Thomas, who also won the highest honors offered by the University in Mathematics, Chemistry and Physics. Lois Anne Lamont won the Univerity Gold Medal in French and the Brandon College Medal in Latin and Philosophy. Other Brandon College Medals were won by Gordon Harvey MacLeod in History and Political Economy, by Mary Catherine Terrell in Religious Studies, and by Norman William MacLeod in Sociology.
