

# "Retrospect and Prospect"

If there is any advantage to be gained by being connected with an institution for an appreciable part of its history, then I suppose that advantage should be mine, with reference to our Alma Mater, for it has been my distinct pleasure and wholesome pride to be associated with Brandon College for over Eighty-Five per cent of her life span.

That Brandon College is celebrating her Fiftieth Anniversary Jubilee this year, gives us all cause for rejoicing for she has reached a very important milestone in her history. The term "milestone" however, significantly points to progress and suggests not an end or a stopping point, but rather a vantage ground gained from which the background might be viewed in perspective and from which too, the future might be sanely anticipated.

As I figuratively stand on the vantage ground of this Fiftieth anniversary, I find myself listening to two voices arising from within; the one calls me back over the path along which Brandon College has made her way thus far; while the other urges me to look forward to what she may yet become. The one voice would tell a story of heroic adventure in the pioneer days of early settlement in Manitoba. It would speak of conviction, faith and vision on the part of those who conceived the idea of placing a college here on these western plains. It would give at least a glimpse of the thing they hoped to establish. With just pride it would point to achievements gained and with regret, it would make brief but significant reference to certain degress of disappointment and failure. Nevertheless, throughout it all there would be, at times, as an undertone and at other times as a great dominant note, that fundamental thing we call hope, which expresses itself in optimism even in seeming defeat.

The other voice would call from distant horizons. It would speak of opportunity—it would emphasize the necessity of development as an essential of life; stress the growing demands of society upon education and even in a modest degree, it would point to requirements in terms of equipment and facilities, to meet the responsibility involved.

I realize that there is little to be gained by dwelling upon the past and yet I make brief reference to it in order to express genuine appreciation of the many efforts, great and small, which have been put forward in the interests of Brandon College, thus making possible the splendid record of achievement for which she is known.

There have been many highlights in the history of Brandon College but to my mind one of the points of greatest adventure and most heroic endeavor came in the year 1938 when, as many of you know, a relatively small group of Brandon citizens saw fit to step into the breach, as it were, to gather up the broken fragments of our Alma Mater, of a former day and to begin piecing them together into a new pattern of somewhat different design. When the history of Brandon College is fully written, as no doubt some day it shall be, I am satisfied that the significance of this great effort will stand out conspicuously in its true light along with the noble endeavors of those who sacrificed as much to bring the college into being over fifty years ago.

But the Past waves to us as the Future beckons.

To become static will rob us of what we have already gained, but to move forward will enable us to see the seeds of our investment in time, labor, and sacrifice, blossom into fruition.

But to move forward it will mean that we will have to provide greater facilities for the work and to this we must give immediate attention. Indeed, with reference to opportunity, in this regard we have already missed the crest of the wave. By a vigorous co-operation on the part of all however, Students, Alumni, Faculty, Board and Citizens, alike, I am satisfied that we can yet make a happy landing at our much needed objective.

This, however, will mean real cooperation in the true sense of the word with a pooling of our best judgment as well as other resources. Working together in goodwill, however, makes it possible to surmount the seemingly insurmountable.

Let us go forward together into the next half century.

#### Curriculum Revision

Major changes are forthcoming in the course arrangement and content for the University of Manitoba. In the third and fourth years, students will be required to take five three unit courses instead of the usual four, four unit subjects. This will help to avoid the concentration on 'specialist' subjects, particularly among science students on the undergraduate level.

In addition, Brandon College has outlined plans for a diploma course in Community Recreation, to meet the demand of Western Manitoba towns for trained leaders. The plans are awaiting the approval of the provincial authorities.

## College Assumes Community Role

In line with the new stress in higher education, since the war Brandon College has been enlarging its functions as a Community College. The affiliation with Manitoba University means that Alma Mater must identify more closely than ever with the Western Manitoba area.

During the 1948-49 term Popular Evening Lectures were offered for the first time. This brought forth an enthusiastic response from the citizens resulting in an enrollment of 180. The experiment was continued during the present year with a similar enrollment and an extended variety of courses available. An interesting feature was the offering of an instructional course in Western Style Dancing which is currently sweeping the country.

In 1948 the College also assumed responsibility for the Brandon Film Council Library of sound films. An energetic campaign conducted by the College raised interest in educational films to the point where there are over 65 showings a month. This is a decided improvement over the average figure of five showings per month. which prevailed before the College entered the field. Climax of the film promotional work was a Film Festival conducted this spring concurrently with Education Week. More than 10,000 people saw education and documentary films. The project was hailed right across Canada as a most outstanding educational achievement.

College broadcasting has been gradually intensified since the war. This year members of the Faculty contributed six radio lectures on the University of the Air Series.

The climax of broadcasting activities came on Wednesday, May 3, when Dr. Evans delivered a radio address over CBW on "The Place of Brandon College in the University." The students are carrying on their own series of programs, broadcasting regularly on Monday evenings throughout the College year.

Brandon College is now offering extension lecture service, sending members of the Faculty into the neighboring towns to carry on discussions of current topics. In addition the former student contact work has been elevated to a level of student advisory work. This spring members of the Brandon College Faculty are visiting all High Schools in Western Manitoba bringing a complete advisory service to the students of our rural high schools. The Music Department makes its contribution to the community emphasis by sponsoring a short refresher course for music teachers annually during the early part of September.

It will be seen from the foregoing that real leadership is being given in the field of education. As the population on the prairies grows and the College facilities expand Brandon College is increasing its services, keeping in step with the vision

that brought about the founding of Brandon College during the early pioneering days.

## Brandon College Jubilee Expansion Campaign

On April 4, 1949, a number of interested citizens met in the Olympia Grill Room, Brandon, to make plans for a larger group. to meet and discuss an expansion program for Brandon College. On April 13 a suppermeeting was held in St. Paul's Church, Brandon, at which a group of 105 citizens, representing all organizations in Brandon, met and passed a resolution to institute a campaign with an over all objective of \$500,000.00. Colonel H. C. Tutte, was engaged to organize the campaign and he immediately drew up the necessary pledge forms and started preliminary public relations work. The pledge cards were forwarded by the campaign committee to all Alumni members,


In Brandon a special names list was drawn up and it was decided that this group would be canvassed as the first objective to be reached by the committee. Following a successful lead by Brandon's prominent citizens a general canvass is to be held. At the present time, Mr. C. K. Bell, Manager of the local Branch of the Bank of Montreal, and chairman of the Committee, along with Mr. J. Riddell, has organized canvassing teams and collections are now being made from the special names group.

In line with the Jubilee of Brandon College, the campaign is known as Brandon College Jubilee Expansion Program. On the success of this campaign hinges the future of our College, for it is recognized that Brandon College must be in a position to meet the demand of present day education. For adequate facilities we need an auditorium, gymnasium, additional facilities for science studies, a library, a student centre and a renovation of our present plant. It is recognized by all that the campaign is an effort to keep our College in its enviable place in higher education. The campaign will continue until the target is reached. #### Eaton To Run at 81

The distinguished former Canadian, Congressman Charles A. Eaton of New Jersey, has announced that he will run again this fall. Though he will be 81 years old, he says that his mind "is still functioning."

Mr. Eaton was a Baptist minister in Canada at the turn of the century. One of the founders of Brandon College, he was also a predecessor of the Rev. W. A. Cameron in the charge which later built Yorkminster Church, Toronto. At that time, Mr. Eaton says, he was a keen reader of "Saturday Night", and still sees it from time to time. He is the ranking Republican spokesman on foreign policy in the House of Representatives. — Willson Woodside, Saturday Night, Jan. 17/50.

## In Memoriam

Professor William Burton Hurd, 55, distinguished Canadian scholar and teacher, died Friday, February 3, in Hamilton, Ontario, after a long illness. Professor Hurd was a graduate of the University of Manitoba. A Rhodes scholar and author of several books, he is well remembered as an inspiring teacher of Political Economy at Brandon College from 1921 to 1935. In addition to his academic work Professor Hurd served in the first World War and was made a member of the Order of the British Empire for services rendered. He was a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada and Past President of the Canadian Political Science Association. Professor Hurd is typical of the many scholars who have helped to make Brandon College the fine institution it has become. The Alumni Association extends sympathy to Mrs. Hurd and her son Donald.

Judge Wellington Clifton Kelley, B.A., K.C., passed away on March 18 at West Summerland, B.C. Judge Kelley was one of the five members of the first class to grad-


uate from Brandon College in the year 1902. He continued his education in Winnipeg and was called to the Manitoba bar. Stricken with Tuberculosis he was taken to the Okanagan Valley in 1910. Upon regaining comparative health he became one of the most prominent lawyers in the Okanagan. In 1937 he was appointed K.C. and was admitted to the Bench, becoming a Judge of the County Court about the same time.

"Paddy" Peole Pulfer—wife of Doug. Pulfer and well known to a number of the Alumni—and three-year-old Penny Anne, met with their death in a car-train accident in August last year near their home at Weyburn, Saskatchewan. The third occupant, Mrs. Mary Molnar, an employee of the Pulfer's, was also killed. Paddy and Doug. have met with misfortune from time to time and our deepest sympathy is extended at this time to Doug. and to Paddy's family. Paddy is the daugher of E. W. Poole, a member of the Brandon College Board of Directors.

#### PRAIRIE COLLEGE

Winnipeg Times-March 24, 1881 Mr. F. E. Rouleau—formerly colporteur of the Bible Society in this Province has returned from Rapid City where he has been during the winter persuing in Prairie College his studies preparatory to the work of the ministry in the Baptist Church. Hereports that the College term for studyclosed on Friday, the 11th inst. The attendance numbered some fifteen young men-all that the present building will accommodate, the most of whom are preparing for the ministry. Six of the number will reside at Rapid City, and will work on the College farm during the summer, boarding in the institution. Five will mend their time until the re-opening of the College on the first of October in preaching in different parts of Manitoba and the Northwest. The remainder will disperse and spend the intervening time at their own homes. The course of studies pursued during the winter embrace the ordinary branches of collegiate course including English literature, mathematics, Latin, and Greek, also Hebrew and Theology. During the term the students devote their energies exclusively to their studies, but from the close of the session in March until the reopening in October those who continue in the institution apply themselves principally to working on the farm. That they work with a will may be perceived from the following facts: Rev. Dr. Crawford having originated the scheme, Rev. Prof. G. B. Doves went out West about a year ago to found a College taking with himtwelve students. They first selected their land which is in two portions, the one consisting of a quarter section being at Rapid City and the remainder of six quarter sections three miles distant making in all 1,120 acres. They then commenced the work of erecting the College building which is of stone, the dimensions being 28 ft. x 24 ft. and the height three stories. Besides completing the building they broke up some 160 acres of the prairie soil before the season was very far advanced. It is intended during the coming summer, if the requisite funds can be secured, to put an addition to the building so as to provide for the reception of students who have already applied for admission and others who could not be received, owing to want of room. From 180 to 200 acres will be under crop this spring. Five teams are employed in doing the work of the farm. It is calculated that the students who remain on the farm during the summer will earn enough during that time to pay their necessary expenses during the year, that is provide them with board, clothing and books. Rev. Dr. Crawford intends going out to Rapid City with his family in May. It is probable that he himself will afterwards return to England to collect money for carrying on the institution on a more extended scale. The present teaching staff consists of Rev. Prof. Doves, Mrs. Doves, Miss Crawford, daughter of Rev. Dr. Crawford.

## **ENROLMENT**

Since the war enrolment at Brandon College has remained at capacity with 215 students in the Arts and Science Faculty and 250 students in the Music Department. The trend in enrolment is upward as more and more of the rural students become interested in higher education. Each year the need for additional facilities becomes more urgent. Included in the student body are two D.P.'s and one student all the way from New York City.

## New Faculty

Joining the staff this year were E. J. Tyler, Psychology Professor and Director of Athletics; Harold Grant, in the Physics Department, replacing Wes Wong who is on leave of absence at U.B.C. doing graduate work; and Andy Judson, Professor of Political Economy, replacing Earl Savage who is on leave of absence at Harvard. Both Prof. Wong and Prof. Savage will be returning to their teaching duties at Brandon College in the fall.

## **Fire**

No little excitement was caused on March 18 when fire broke out in Clark Hall during Chapel period. The fire, believed to be due to defective wiring, started on the top floor and was confined there by the sprinkler system installed in 1948. There was much concern over books and notes with exams about a month away, but prompt action by the men students saved most of these personal effects. The reading room and back portion of the Chapel served temporarily as dormitories and a number of coeds were billeted in private homes. As this bulletin goes to press (exam. time) extensive repairs have been completed and the coeds have returned to their own rooms.

## Club Activities

The Student Christian Movement has had a very active year. Dr. Merle Patterson, a medical missionary, spoke to the group on social and religious conditions in India. A conferette was held in Brandon College on November 18 and 19 with the theme "The Significance of Jesus and His Teaching"; there was a series of discussions led by Rev. Ongley on "Men, Women and God"; six delegates attended the Western Canada Conference at Saskatoon in December, and members have from time to time participated in church services throughout the district.

The Public Speaking and International \Relations Clubs have also been active. The latter group took the topic "Communism" as a study theme.

#### HEROIC COUPLET


