## A MESSAGE FROM DR. ROBBINS

Among the alumni coming to Brandon for the Thanksgiving weekend were a couple of freshmen—more accurately a freshman and a freshette. These were the Robbins, and happily we were allowed to take part in the celebration, in spite of our junior status.

It was a real pleasure to see so many of the students of yesteryear on the campus. It was not a surprise, for I had heard from some of them at the time my appointment was announced, as well as from former professors at the College, and the latter bespoke their continuing interest and loyalty. Stanley Knowles, I imagine, used words that many of you might have used, when he wrote of the "institution that has meant much to a great many of us".

Senior among the former professors from whom I heard was Dr. W. Sherwood Fox, retired president of the University of Western Ontario, who taught Classics here, 1900-09. Next was Dr. D. A. MacGibbon, former head of the Department of Economics, University of Alberta, later member of the Board of Grain Commissioners, now retired and living in Hamilton. He taught Economics at Brandon, 1908-17, and was followed by Dr. W. A. Mackintosh, 1917-19, who wrote from Kingston where he is principal and vice-chancellor of Queen's University: "I have had a long-standing interest in Brandon College and have always had the belief that it had a distinct position in the educational work of the West and a very useful role to fill."

Professor W. C. D. Pacey (English, 1940-44), now head of the Department of English, University of New Brunswick, had a generous word to say of the students of his years in Brandon: "The College was a pleasant place to teach. Most of the students came from small towns or farms, and were genuinely eager to learn. I have never received such an enthusiastic response to my lectures as I had there."

There were messages, too, from Dr. J. H. Aitchison, now professor of Political Science at Dalhousie University, from Dr. L. H. Cragg, vice-president of the University of Alberta, from the Hon. Walter G. Dinsdale, from Heath N. Macquarrie, M.P., and from many others, wishing me well and saying a good word

for the College and the students of their day at Brandon.

Clearly you are members of a respected body—graduates of an institution that holds a place of affection and esteem among those who know it well. It must be my resolve and yours to see that this sound basis of prestige is maintained in the years that lie before us.

### ALUMNI HOMECOMING

The first Alumni Homecoming ever organized at Brandon College was attended by more than one hundred graduates and former students. Taking time off from their Thanksgiving week-end, the Alumni spent October 8 touring the new Arts and Library building, watching the traditional College Caps - Notre Dame Hounds football game ,and meeting old friends at the Homecoming Dance.

Football honours went to the visitors from Saskatchewan, who seem to have a habit of winning the Fall classic. The host Caps scored the first touchdown, however, and despite the fact that most of the players were getting their first taste of college competition, played better than the 31-14 score would indicate.

The only Brandon victory in the seven meetings between the two clubs was an 8-7 verict in 1959.

Of special interest to Alumni was the opening kick-off, performed by Homecoming Queen, Anne Lane, a fourth year Arts student. Miss Lane had arrived on the field in an open convertible, heading the parade which included the other three queen candidates, the cheerleaders, the Legion majorettes, and the Sea Cadets' Marching Band.

The dance in the Earl Oxford School auditorium was the evening attraction. Two skits, one presented by the Students' Association and the other by the Alumni, featured festivities at intermission. Class yells, some of them rusty but all of them loud, provided a traditional conclusion to the dance and gave friends a chance to congregate for the house-parties to follow.

Sunday morning saw a final gathering of the week-end guests and hosts at the Alumni church service in Knox United Church.

## IN MEMORY OF MISS E. R. WHITESIDE FIRST PRINCIPAL OF CLARK HALL

"To hundreds of members of the Brandon College Alumni Association across Canada the word of the passing of Ernestine Whiteside in March of this year brought a pang of genuine personal loss.

Miss Whiteside, a graduate of McMaster University who had taken post-graduate study in Berlin, came to Brandon College in 1906 when the girls' residence was not yet completed. She was a mem-

ber of the College faculty, teaching English and German at the university level. Added to this, she was the first Principal of Clark Hall. Hers was the task of setting standards and building traditions. The measure of her success in teaching the art of gracious living may best be estimated by recognizing her imprint on her many devoted students, who learned from her that life should be a road of courage and of beauty.

A true believer in discipline, Miss Whiteside had an iron will where she felt that principle was involved, but she asked of no one else a standard as rigid as that which she set for herself. The whole pattern of her life was an ex-

ample of devotion to her duty.

To me she was a queen, in her stately walk, in her vision of the dignity and purpose of life and in her Christian character. She made a contribution to the early life of Brandon College which made it a cultural center for the whole community.'

The above tribute was written by Maria (Grant) Nelson '25. Mrs. Nelson, and Mrs. Frances (Wolverton) Yeomans '19 have been named by the Alumni executive as a committee of two to suggest a way of honouring the memory of the late Miss Whiteside. The committee's report will be made to the regular Novem-

ber meeting of the executive.

This action was initiated by a letter from Mrs. Vera (Leech) MacNeill '12 who suggested that "in the plans for new buildings some suitable memorial to Miss Whiteside should be incorporated." In making this suggestion, Mrs. MacNeill goes on to say, "The number of graduates and ex-students and faculty members whose lives came under her marvellous influence becomes rapidly smaller with the passing of time, but there are still many who would share my views I am sure. As the first "Lady Principal" of the College who established the Clark Hall traditions hers was not an easy task. Her standards seemed unattainably high, but admitted no compromise. With growing appreciation of this in after years, her 'old Clark Hall girls' of half a century ago felt no Toronto visit was complete without a visit to her, and none ever found herself forgotten."

### **EXPANSION PROGRESS**

Graduates who have lived in the Brandon College residence will be especially pleased to know that the next building stage will include a new residence and dining hall.

Planned to accommodate 152 students. the residence will be built on the southwest corner of the campus, connected by underground and over-top link to the new dining hall to the north of it. It will be a three-storey structure, with a basement which can accommodate laundry facilities, recreation rooms, etc. There will be a private suite for the resident master, and an infirmary for residence use.

The dining hall, a square one-storey building, will include an unobstructed

area to accommodate not less than 350 people. The kitchen area will be equipped to serve either cafeteria or dining room style, and will provide very adequate banquet facilities. The basement will house a canteen and will have other available room.

Work is due to commence on these new buildings as soon as possible after tenders are opened in November.
