GENERAL MEETING JANUARY 31

The Alumni General Meeting held in the John R. C. Evans Lecture Theatre gave opportunity to bring the membership up to date on Executive action, and brought forth some discussion.

A report from the Evans Loan Fund was given by the General Secretary, and the Treasurer gave an interim report.

Whiteside Memorial Established—The report of Mrs. W. G. Nelson and Mrs. A. Yeomans re establishing a memorial for the late Miss E. R. Whiteside, was received. The report concluded with the recommendation that "the Brandon College Alumni Association make available to the Brandon College Library Commit-tee the sum of \$500 over five years, in order that the Encyclopedia of World Art may be purchased and placed in the Brandon College Library as a memorial from the Brandon College Alumni Association to the memory of Miss Ernestine R. Whiteside." Approval of the report was carried.

There was discussion of the possibility that this might set a precedent in the establishing of memorials by the Alumni Association. (As a result of this, the next meeting of the Executive passed a motion to establish future Alumni policy in this regard, viz., a policy of publicizing and encouraging recognition of the need of specific memorials as these needs arise, but not necessarily directly supporting memorials from Alumni funds).

Board of Directors Representative-Following the report of the Committee which had been formed to look into this possibility, the following motion was carried:

"That until such time as the by-laws of incorporation of Brandon College make provision for an alumni representative on the Board of Directors, an alumni nominee be elected in the same manner as executive officers; that his

qualifications shall be: a member or associate member in good standing of the B.C.A.A.; a graduate of ten years' standing of a degree course from a recognized university; and that he be a non-voting member of the Executive, with his duty being to officially represent the Alumni Association on the Board of Directors so that the Alumni Association may take a more active part in furthering the interests of Brandon College".

College President Invites Suggestions-In his address at the conclusion of the business meeting, Dr. John E. Robbins stated that the College depends on strong Alumni interest-made evident not only by financial support, but by good public relations and in interesting students in entering university work. In taking a critical look at the expansion program, Dr. Robbins invited discussion on the proposed order of development of the master plan. There was some response from the group. The hope was expressed that Dr. Robbins' words would stimulate further thinking along these lines, and that Alumni members would feel free to express opinions which might help to guide College administration in future planning.

J. R. C. EVANS MEMORIAL STUDENT LOAN FUND

This year has seen a real increase in the number of student loans, as the Evans Loan Fund becomes more widely known. The following gives a picture of its use:

CALGARY BRANCH HOLDS ANNUAL MEETING

A letter from Donna (Christie) Minions, former secretary of the Calgary Branch of the Brandon College Alumni, tells of the annual meeting and banquet held on March 11th.

Following are members elected to the new executive:

The main item of business was a motion to close out the Living Endowment Fund of the Calgary branch, and contribute the \$381.00 (plus interest) which remains to the Brandon College Expansion Fund.

Guest speaker Bob Smellie, M.L.A. for Russell-Birtle, is a former student of Brandon College. As a member of the

College Board of Directors, he was able to bring first hand news on College progress.

PRESIDENT'S SCHOLARSHIPS ESTABLISHED

Announcement was made in December of the establishment of a scholarship in each department of Brandon College by the new president, Dr. John E. Robbins. The Arts award and the Science award of \$200 each are available to the students proceeding to Fourth Year in Brandon College with the best academic record in the Second and Third years of Arts or Science, if of scholarship standard.

The Education scholarship of \$200 is to be awarded to the graduate student (of any university) who enters the Faculty of Education at Brandon College with the best academic record in undergraduate work, if of scholarship standard.

In Music, a \$200 scholarship may be awarded to a senior student of conspicuous promise in the Music Department of Brandon College.

LORNE WATSON WINS SCHOLARSHIP

Professor Lorne Watson, Director of the Brandon College Music Department since 1948, has received a \$2,000 Canada Council Scholarship for study abroad or in Canada. Mr. Watson will be on leave of absence during the 1961-62 academic year, and will pursue doctorate studies at the University of Indiana.

HURD MICROFILM ROOM ESTABLISHED

A microfilm room in the new Brandon College library has been endowed by Donald Hurd, to be dedicated to the memory of his father, W. Burton Hurd.

Prof. Burton Hurd will be fondly remembered by many College alumni and former students as the professor of Political Economy from 1921 to 1935, and as Dean of Arts during his last six years at the College.

The microfilm room will make available much valuable material which is out of print. One of the first sets of microfilm received was a donation from the Brandon Daily Sun consisting of issues of the first years of this newspaper.

EDUCATION FACULTY MEMBER TO WINNIPEG

Miss M. K. Harpley, Instructor in Primary Methods in the Education and Teacher Training Faculty during the past six years, will be leaving Brandon College this year to accept an appointment in Winnipeg. Known throughout Canada for her outstanding work in Primary Methods, Miss Harpley will assume the position of consultant to the Jewish private schools in Winnipeg.

NEW CHEMISTRY FACILITIES PROVIDED

Recent Alumni visitors to the College have found another new development—A Chemistry lab for senior students now occupies the lower floor of the Science building and features the finest in modern equipment. Dr. H. V. Kidd has planned the lab for maximum convenience, and has selected equipment which can be readily incorporated in the new science building to be constructed in the near future.

PIANO HONOURS MEMORY OF PROFESSOR VINING

The new John R. C. Evans Lecture Theatre has become the home of an elegant Steinway Concert Grand piano. The piano was donated by its owner, Mrs. A. W. Vining of Victoria, B.C., as a tribute to the active role played by her husband, Dr. Vining in the founding and early years of Brandon College.

Dr. Vining was a member of the first faculty of Brandon College in 1899, and remained as professor of Physics and Mathematics until 1917.

Mrs. Vining, a pianist of outstanding talent, composed the music for which her husband wrote the words of "Hail Our College"—the salute still sung at all Brandon College functions.

The fact that the Expansion office classifies as "Alumni" all former students indicates that the percentage of contributing Alumni is still relatively small.


The objective over five years is \$1,000,000—and the provincial government's "two for one" agreement will bring this total up to \$3,000,000. Mr. W. A. Prugh, who now has his Expansion Committee office at the College, is keeping up an active campaign to raise this sum and, at the same time, to publicize the ever-increasing program being carried on at Brandon College.

PROFESSORS PROBE NEW LEARNING METHODS

The coming year will see application of new instruction methods in languages at Brandon College. The language laboratory included in the new Library contains ten listening booths for students to work with tape recording and listening facilities.

A number of teaching machines are presently in the preparation process. Use of these is not confined to language drill, and they are expected to facilitate the learning of routine subject matter, leaving the instructor more time to teach application of facts and appreciation of the overall subject matter.

These new learning aids are among the first to be made available in Canada, and Brandon College faculty members are contributing to their establishment by preparation of programs, and by experimentation with equipment.

NOW UNDER CONSTRUCTION

The summer, 1961 program at Brandon College includes completion of the new men's residence, the dining hall, and the new heating plant. Construction is reported to be on schedule for the residence and dining hall which are expected to be ready for occupancy in 1961-62.

ENTRANCE SCHOLARSHIPS ANNOUNCED

In an effort to encourage first-class academic work at Brandon College, the Board of Directors has announced establishment of entrance scholarships in each of the 21 most westerly school divisions in Manitoba. Applications will be invited from students completing Grade XII or Senior Matriculation with an average of 80 per cent or higher. The awards will be made solely on the basis of academic standing.

The scholarships will have a potential value of \$900 each. In the first instance, they will provide free tuition in second year Arts and Science or in Teacher Training, whichever course is chosen by the successful applicant. If a scholarship winner completes second year Arts or Science with an average of 75 percent, his scholarship may be renewed for third year, and if he maintains an average of 75 percent in third year it may be renewed for fourth year. Tuition fees, beginning in 1961-62, are expected to be \$300 per year; hence remission of them for three years would represent a value of \$900 for the student.

MUSIC DEPARTMENT EXPANDS

1961-62 will see the beginning of woodwind instruction in the Brandon College Music Department. Mr. Franz Zeidler, who has for the past three years been head of the Wind Instrument Department of the University of Saskatchewan Conservatory of Music in Regina, will become the first instructor in this department at Brandon College. At the same time, Mr. Zeidler will give woodwind instruction in Brandon schools, and he hopes to find in Brandon a nucleus for symphony orchestra production.

Also in the Music Department, Mr. Lawrence Jones, of the University of Manitoba will come to Brandon for one year while the Director, Mr. Watson is on leave of absence for further study.
