New Faculty Members

The 1961-62 academic year will see a number of additions to the faculty ranks at Brandon College. Enrolment increase, the addition of new courses and operating of new facilities have wrought quite a change in the academic picture.

Dr. Arthur de Sousa, a distinguished chemist from the University of Lisbon, Portugal is joining the teaching staff of the Chemistry Department. After attending school in England, Dr. de Sousa received his Master of Science and Doctor of Science degrees in Physical Chemistry from the University of Lausanne in Switzerland. He later obtained the Ph.D. degree from the University of Fribourg. Since 1946 he has taught physical and inorganic chemistry at the University of Lisbon, and has published many studies and research papers.

Also joining the Chemistry department will be Donald N. Adams, a science graduate of Brandon College in 1954. He returns to the College from Weston, Ontario to become manager of chemistry stores and laboratories, after several years in industry. The Brandon College Chemistry department is now able to offer a double sequence for students contemplating honours work in the field.

In Mathematics and Physics, the employment of Mr. S. Klippenstein, a recent

graduate of the University of Manitoba, has facilitated the offering of an extra course in each of these subjects.

Prof. Emile Glenisson, whose extensive European education is augmented by an M.A. from the University of Montreal, brings to the French department the services of a professor whose native tongue is French. In addition, Prof. Glenisson will provide French instruction for the students in the Education and Teacher Training faculty.

The list of appointees in the Faculty of Education and Teacher Training this year includes one full-time professor, Mr. J. A. Voth, recently principal of Neepawa Area Collegiate Institute. In addition, a number of persons have joined the faculty on a part-time basis. They include specialists in Art, Primary Methods, Children's Library, Speech and in Health Education.

Besides the two persons announced in the May issue of the Alumni News as joining the School of Music, two teachers of piano have been engaged. Replacing Miss Rhea Forder will be Mrs. Elva B. Spalding, who has had several years' music teaching experience, both in the Ontario Ladies' College where she obtained her degrees, and in the Shoal Lake district of Manitoba, where she has resided for some years.

Miss Caroline Terry, a teacher of some distinction from Port Arthur, Ontario, will instruct junior students in piano and theory.

College Welcomes Hong Kong Guest

The Brandon College branch of World University Service of Canada is now realizing a project which has been eagerly anticipated. Among the students registering at the College this year was Anthony Chow Wei Chik, a Chinese refugee student from Hong Kong. Sponsored by Brandon College WUS funds, "Tony" is enrolled in Second year Science and has already won a warm welcome in College circles.

The WUS organization is unique in that it draws on both students and faculty for its membership. During the past two years members of the Brandon WUS group have realized the necessary funds for this scholarship through conducting candy sales, raffles, a shoeshine day, and other ingenious endeavours. Besides such practical projects as offering education to a refugee student, the group carries on an educational program aimed at furthering understanding between student communities on an international scale.

Former Professor Returns For Tenth Anniversary

On September 27th students from Brandon College will meet with students from Minot State Teachers College for the tenth annual International Relations Conference at the International Peace Garden.

The topic of discussion this year is "The United Nations", and students have this summer been doing advance reading on the subject, so that they may get the most out of the day-long discussion and study groups. Alumni who were here when the first of these conferences was held will be especially interested in knowing that Heath N. Macquarrie, M.P. will be the guest speaker at the evening banquet. While a professor of Political Science at the College in 1952, Mr. Macquarrie was instrumental in the founding of this annual event. Since he left the College two years later, the Conference has been carried on by the International Relations Club with Prof. Norma Walmsley as its adviser, and has covered such topics as "Germany", "The Far East", "Russia", "Africa", and "China".

Residence Nears Completion

In spite of unforeseen delays, it is expected that the new men's residence will be ready for occupancy by the end of September. Construction on the dining hall is going ahead as scheduled, and it is anticipated that it will be in readiness for the beginning of second term.

The space formerly occupied by the men's residence in the main building is being refurbished so that it is now an extension of the Clark Hall ladies' residence. Now that the heating plant for the College is under construction, serious thought is being given to selection of the next building to be planned. In all matters concerning campus development, the suggestions and opinions of Alumni members are very much welcomed by the Administration.

Montreal Events Honour Brandon College President

As part of the schedule of events which occurred in connection with the gathering of the Learned Societies in Montreal early in June, two occasions were set aside to mark Dr. John E. Robbins' long service to the social sciences and humanities. An evening session of the Canadian Political Science Association was held in Dr. Robbins' honour, and on June 10 a dinner was held to mark the end of his 20-year period as secretary-treasurer of the Humanities Research Council of Canada and the Social Sciences Research Council of Canada. Dr. A. E. Trueman, Director of the Canada Council, was chairman of the dinner, attended by representatives of all Canadian universities.

Diarmid, first president of Brandon College. Entitled "The Life Story of a Leper", it is the autobiography of John E. Davis, brother to George Davis who was one of the founders of Prairie College at Rapid City in 1889. The early part of his story tells of a visit to his brother here in the West, and gives insight into the days when Brandon College was realizing her beginnings.

Enrolment Increase Seen

The 1981-62 registration now being completed has brought a fairly sharp increase in Brandon College enrolment, particularly in Second Year Arts and Science. Although enrolment figures are likely to alter with individual changes during the first month or so, the overall picture now shows 287 full-time Arts and Science students, plus 1930 enrolled in evening courses. In Education I there is a record enrolment of 24 students, while Teacher Training classes have 107 members. The Music Department also shows an increase in the number of students over last year.

It should be pointed out that increasing generosity of individuals in making bursary and scholarship assistance available has this year made it possible for many students to take advantage of the opportunity of college education.

Loan Fund Constitution Adopted

At the Annual Meeting of the Brandon College Alumni Association on May 27, 1961, a formal constitution for the J. R. C. Evans Memorial Student Loan Fund was adopted.

The constitution outlines the officers and duties of officers in connection with the Trustee Committee, Selection Committee and Investment Committee, and states definite regulations for the guidance of students who take advantage of the Fund.

The Alumni General Secretary, in her report to the September meeting of the Alumni executive, stated that three years' experience in operating the almost \$17,000 Fund has shown a good proportion of the Loan Fund money being circulated, a good record of repayment, and in most cases a definite need being fulfilled in assisting worthy students.

Summer School Successful

The first summer school for university students ever to be held on the Brandon College campus was hailed as a very fine service to the people of Brandon and surrounding districts this year. Courses were offered in Second Year French, Mathematics, English and History, with an over-all registration of some one hundred students.

Evening courses now in session include Second Year courses in English, Psychology, and French in addition to History HI and Philosophy III.


Plans are already being formulated for summer school for 1962. These are, of course, assisted greatly by the fine new buildings and facilities now in use at Brandon College.
