Making their skills available to the citizens of Brandon for any and all jobs, the blue and gold beanied workers were to be seen washing windows, mowing lawns, baby-sitting and carrying out various household and office tasks.

At the end of the day, the well-organized committee, under the chairmanship of Brian Foster, tallied a total of over \$750. Proceeds from the work day go toward provision of World University Service scholarships for WUS-sponsored students attending Brandon College.

Two New Buildings Under Construction

On Thursday, August 30, Mr. R. O. Lissaman, Brandon's Member of the Legislative Assembly, turned the sod to officially pronounce the beginning of construction of the new home of the Brandon College School of Music. Situated on the north-east corner of the campus, the music building will house facilities for instruction in and enjoyment of Music and Fine Arts.

Three weeks later the sod was turned for the new Ladies' Residence by Mrs. E. C. Cowan, Dean of Clark Hall. Wearing a 'hard hat' presented to her by the construction firm in charge, Mrs. Cowan expressed the hope that the fine traditions and memories associated with Clark Hall might be carried forward into the new surroundings. Ames, President of the Brandon Ministerial Association, took part in the ceremony.

French: Miss Anne M. Loutit, on leave of absence from Winnipeg School Division; graduate from University of Manitoba with post-grad courses at McGill, the Sorbonne and Purdue University.

History: Michael P. Czuboka, Brandon College and University of Manitoba graduate instructing in First Year History while teaching in a Brandon high school.

Physics: Mr. David R. Eaton, University of Manitoba graduate serving as lab steward.

Physical Education: Mr. Joseph Marshall, graduate of Springfield College.

Political Science: Mr. A. R. Kear, graduate of Royal Military College and Queen's University at Kingston.

Psychology: Dr. S. L. Kong, graduate

of Hwa Kiu University in Hong Kong and University of Ottawa.

Sociology: Mr. Henry Cooperstock, graduate of Boston University and graduate student of Columbia University, replaces Mr. Wm. Zwerman.

Botany and Zoology: Mr. Alfred Rogosin, graduate of the University of Minnesota and graduate student of the University of Manitoba has assumed Botany teaching duties of Prof. R. H. Hannah who is on a year's leave of absence for graduate study. Ian Dickson, Brandon College graduate of 1958 and graduate student at the University of Manitoba is teaching Botany in Mr. Hannah's place.

School of Music Faculty Changes

Prof. Lorne Watson, Director of the School of Music has returned from his year's study at Bloomington, Indiana.

Miss Peggy Sharpe, who will be on leave in 1962-63 is replaced for this year by Mr. Lawrence Jones who taught in place of Prof. Watson during his absence.

Prof. Lucien Needham, one of the foremost voice teachers in Western Canada, has commuted from Winnipeg for the past two years. He has now taken up residence in Brandon to teach full time at the College.

Mr. Kenneth Nichols of Edmonton will conduct classes for children following the Carl Orff method.

The woodwinds-strings department has been strengthened by the coming of Mr. and Mrs. David L. Sublette from Indiana. David L. Sublette teaches clarinet and other orchestral instruments, while Patricia A. Sublette offers instruction in 'cello.
