

Commencement Speaker will be Dr. Charles W. Lightbody, Associate Professor of History, University of Saskatchewan, Regina Campus. Dr. Lightbody is a former Saskatchewan Rhodes Scholar. In addition to the University of Saskatchewan and Oxford University, he has studied at the University of Toronto, Harvard University, and Cornell University from which he received the Ph.D. degree.

Dr. Lightbody's main interest is in European History. He published a widely acclaimed book last year, entitled Judgements of Joan, showing how western society had varied and changed over the years in judging Joan of Arc. He has also lectured and broadcast widely on contemporary international problems.

## Student Activities Building — **Progress to Date**

The tentative floor plans printed on page 5 of this bulletin convey, more clearly than can words, the progress made in planning for the Student Activities Building at the College. These drawings have resulted from months of discussion and consideration. The purpose of publishing them is to solicit sug-gestions for possible revision from members of the Alumni Association—We will welcome your comments. your comments.

your comments. To date 143 Alumni members have pledged \$10,323 toward the cost of the building, and cash for the first year of pledges is coming in. The remainder of the \$250,000 is expected to come from new Alumni pledges, the \$10 per-capita annual student assessment (this year from for the state of the state of the state of the state to come from new Alumni pledges, the \$10 per-capita annual student assessment (this

be come norm new number preuges, the stopper-capita annual student assessment (this year \$4300 was realized), and expansion fund capital (including government grant of \$2 for every \$1 from the above sources). Now that concrete building plans are un-derway, it is hoped that Alumni (and partic-ularly those fairly recent graduates who have first-hand experience of the College's grow-ing needs in this area) will take this oppor-tunity to complete and return the enclosed pledge form. To date donations have been very generous; their number must be in-creased considerably to assure success. A couple of facts to supplement the printed plans: Commencement of biulding in the fall of 1\$3 will fit most readily into the over-all financing pattern of the expansion program.

The student offices, formerly intended for this building, have been adequately provided for on the lower floor of the new dining hall.

Any other questions? This building will be identified with the Alumni—You should be-come involved, through your interest and, if possible, through your financial support.

The new Music and Fine Arts building, seen under construction on the North-East corner of the campus will be completed soon, and will be in use this fall. # **Brandon College Offers Bachelor of Music Degree**

The 1963-64 academic year will see another 'first' for Brandon College, as the profes-sional degree course in Music is introduced for the first time in Manitoba.

for the first time in Manitoba. This event follows logically the develop-ment which has taken place in the Brandon College School of Music during the past few years. Director Lorne Watson state; "It is a four-year Bachelor of Music course with a major in Music Education. Although the degree itself will be one granted through the University of Manitoba, the courses leading to the B.Mus. will be offered at the present time only at Brandon College." The purpose of the course is to train teach-

The purpose of the course is to train teach-ers who will become music specialists (in high schools, particularly), but who will also be able to teach one or two academic sub-jects. Following graduation in Music, as in the case of Arts or Science, students will be eligible to enrol in the Faculty of Education for a year of teacher training.

Other exciting developments in the School of Music will be described in a special issue of the Alumni News on the occasion of the official opening of the Music and Fine Arts building this fall.

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
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### Alumni Star at Pan-American Games

As a gesture of congratulation to those who this year look back fifty years to their Brandon College graduation day, we have invited the members of Class of '13 to speak through the pages of our Alumni News.

On that Commencement day in 1913, 16 students—11 in Arts, 4 in Theology and one in Music—went forth as Brandon College grad-uates. Of these, we pay tribute to the mem-ory of Mrs. Evelyn (Simpson) Buck, Mr. Reg Edwards, Dr. J. R. C. Evans, Rev. Tom H. Harris and Mr. William E. Wilkin.

Messages received for this issue bring news of five of the class members: Mrs. Wilha (Speers) Brandon, of Regina, writes, "During a brief visit with Mrs. Carter last fall, I was a brief visit with Mrs. Carter last fall, I was taken to visit the new buildings on campus of my alma mater. I was especially pleased at the memorial to our former class-mate, Jack Evans. My hope and prayer is that Brandon College will always represent the highest and best in education."

And from Calgary, Dr. "Scottie" Gordon says, "This year celebrates for me fifty years since graduation, since ordination to the Christian Ministry, since our wedding and since we went to India as missionaries of the Canadian Baptist Mission. Thanks to God's goodness, we are still going strong."

#### 1913 - 1963

This is the title of a reminiscent article written for the Alumni News by Rev. F. J. Noble of Walmer, Kent, England, excerpts from which are printed below: "Brandon! Brandon! My heart missed a

"Brandon! Brandon! My heart missed a beat that late afternoon hour in September, 1913. I had arrived—or almost arrived—at the end of my journey of 4500 miles from the 'Old Country'.

With no idea where to find the college I wandered from the station toward the first road junction. There, I found three young ladies waiting for a street-car, and I ventured to ask for the necessary directions. Six mischievous eyes sparkled with the spirit of suppressed mirth, and one voice answered for all: "Come with us. That's where we're going."

going. With feelings both nervous and grateful, I followed my guides on to the next street-car, and we soon reached the college stop. There stood BRANDON COLLEGE and CLARK HALL united by a dwarf section which I discovered later to be the college chapel. No other building stood on the campus at that time, and very few houses had been erected on the land beyond.

On the steps of Brandon College I was met by Dr. H. L. MacNeill who remarked, "So you're from London? Some of us would like to be going there..' This sally was followed with a very genial and friendly smile, and I was conducted to the Library where an introduction to "Another Englishman" followed.

The welcome to the College life was both whole hearted and warmhearted and the free and open spirit of college life was a sheer delight. The teaching staff and the student body "rolled along" in good companionship and to high purpose in life.

Those student days of fifty years gone by were great days, and very sincerely do we hope that, fifty years on, the students of today will look back with a like sense of gratitude toward their Alma Mater. God bless Brandon College and all her brood."
