

The Congress called for meetings at the University of London, England, between the dates Monday 15th July and Friday 19th July. Plenary sessions were held with some choices between the subjects: "The Diversity of Universities of the Commonwealth," "Significant University Developments in the Commonwealth, 1958-63: United Kingdom" and "Significant University Developments in the Commonwealth 1958-63: Nigeria" Group discussions were held on the following subjects: "The Place of the Layman in University Government," "The University Student" and "Co-operation Among Universities of the Commonwealth" Commonwealth "

Social functions included: A Royal Garden Party for the Congress, receptions by the University of London and by Her Majesty's Government; a Congress Dinner; and a reception by the Lord Mayor of London and the "Twelve Great Companies." Concurrent with these were sessions, discussions, a Ladies' Programme and an opportunity to see the Bolshoi Ballet and other London shows and night spots

Before, during and after the Congress vizits were made to United Kingdom univerand after the Congress sities as their guests. Our schedule included University of Southampton where we saw a university that had grown from College to University in a few short years, much like our own Brandon College! Side-trips to such places as Stonehenge and other points of interest were arranged by our hosts Other universities visited were Cambridge, Imperial universities visited were Cambridge, Imperial College, London, Aberdeen, Glasgow and Belfast. Not only did we have the opportunity of seeing the universities, but we also enjoyed hospitality that beggars description. Watching the punting on the "Cam" to dancing to the bagpipes were matched by sight seeing in Northern Ireland ard London.

British Libraries

This past spring I had the honour of being invited by the British Council to spend six weeks in Great Britain as their guest, to observe the organization and operation of British libraries.

The tour included all types of libraries evoted to general education, including devoted to public and county libraries. Any description of the British library system must start with a brief reference to the system of education.

The British system starts with the primary school for children aged five to seven years. This is followed by the junior school, and then the "eleven plts" examination. Next. the student is directed into a course of studies deemed suitable for his abilities and aptitudes. The course leading to university entrance is offered in the grammar schools. Courses oriented toward general education are offered in the secondary modern schools, and those oriented toward trade-type technical courses in the technical courses on nical courses in the technical colleges. On the higher-education level there are two distinct types of institutions: the universities accepting only those students with a high academic standing, and emphasizing the humanities and social science, the colleges of advanced technology.

But where do libraries fit into this struc-

ture?

Virtually every person in England and Scotland has access to a tax-supported library. For the most part, these libraries are organized on a broad population basis, even in rural areas Systems for facilitating co-

operation between libraries are well developed.

The practice of planned subject specialization and inter-library lending between libraries in specific regions has developed more fully than is generally common in North America The public libraries in British cities have first reference collections and excellent

resources for recreational reading.

The British public uses libraries the way we use supermarkets. Mother or father goes to the library to bring home the weekly supply of books, just as we bring home groceries. Holborn, the business district of London, has an excellent children's collection—the business men come at lunch time to get the latest "Noddy" book for junior. Several libraries have Telex facilities. Communication between major libraries in Edinburgh and London is a matter of typing out a message and waiting a minute or two for a reply.

Each level of education has library facilities devoted to its own needs. The univer-

sities in many cases have great collections; however, lack of money tends to hamper some of them in their attempts to organize their collections effectively. Library service to the professional courses in technology are, perhaps, more limited than in this country because students in these courses do not have as direct access to the university libraries as do Canadian students in similar fields. School library development is somewhat comparable to that in similar institutions in Canada. The all-inclusive pupil-teacher library system of the London County Council Education Committee, and the measures practiced by several counties designed to introduce small chil-dren to libraries, might warrant close study in Canadian educational circles

The timetable drawn up by the British Council enabled me to see many tourist attractions, to meet friends and relatives and, in general, to have the time of my life. I consider myself very fortunate, and feel that the broadening experience will be very helpful in my work.
