## COLLEGE HOSTS 196"FOUR" EXHIBIT

Paintings and drawings by four Brandon artists comprise the first art exhibit to be displayed in the new Music Building since its opening last fall. Three of the four artists are connected with Brandon College — Mrs. Alma Perry, wife of the Head of the English Department, Mrs. Edna King whose husband is Associate Dean of Arts, and Paul Panton, an Arts student at the College share honours with Steve Repa, their instructor at Brandon's Allied Arts Centre.

The display is open to the public and, as pointed out by President Robbins at the official opening, it helps to achieve the purpose of the Music and Art Building as a home for the aural and visual arts.

## NATIONAL SOURCES SUPPORT FACULTY RESEARCH

National Research Council awards announced recently include a \$3000 grant to enable Prof. Harvey Young '55 of the Brandon College Geology Department to undertake a petrographic study of the Virden member of the Lodgepole formation of southwestern Manitoba. At the same time, Profs. Walter Rodewald and Robin T. Rye received a \$2000 grant toward continuation of research now in progress.

Canada Council grants will also assist two Brandon College professors this summer. Dr. W. W. McCutcheon, Dean of Education, will make a comparative study of standards of staff and work in universities of the Western provinces, taking into account such factors as academic qualifications, teaching loads, ratio of staff to students, research done and other professional work accomplished.

Also receiving Canada Council assistance will be Prof. H. Cooperstock of the Department of Sociology, who will do a study of a research project conducted for Ford Motor Company.

## BRANDON COLLEGE SUMMER SCHOOL, 1964

This summer will once again see courses for university credit offered at Brandon College. June 15 is the last date

## PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION

Lloyd Henderson, a committee of one to review the Alumni constitution, presented the following proposed revisions to a recent Executive meeting. They are subject to approval of the Annual Meeting:

It is believed to be desirable for several reasons to change the business year of the Association to correspond with the calendar year. This will require the following changes in the constitution:

#### • ARTICLE IV. Fees (A) which now reads

(A) The business year shall extend from June 1st to May 31st, and newly elected officers shall assume their duties on June 1st

(A) The business year of the Association shall correspond with the calendar year and extend from January 1st to December 31st.

#### ARTICLE V. Executive Board and Committees (A) (5) which now reads

(A) (5) An auditor shall be appointed by the Executive Board at least one month prior to the Annual Meeting.

#### shall be amended to read:

(A) (5) An auditor shall be appointed by the Executive Board annually and an audited financial statement shall be presented by the General Secretary to the annual meeting in May.

Due to practical considerations it is believed desirable to centralize the secretary's and treasurer's work in one office. Consequently the following amendments are proposed:

#### ● ARTICLE V. Executive Board and Committees (A) (3) which now reads

(A) (3) The officers of the Association shall be: President, First Vice, Second Vice, Third Vice-President, General Secretary and Treasurer.

(A) (3) The officers of the Association shall be: President, First Vice, Second Vice, Third Vice-President and General Secretary.

#### ● ARTICLE V. (A) (4) (b) which now reads

(A) (4) (b) The First Vice-President shall assist the President, and in his absence shall fulfill all the duties of the President.

#### shall be amended to read:

(A) (4) (b) The First Vice-President shall assist the President and in his absence shall fulfill all the duties of the President. He shall also be Treasurer and Chairman of the Finance Committee.

#### ARTICLE V. (A) (4) (e) and (f) which now read

(A) (4) (e) The General Secretary shall keep minutes of all meetings of the Association and of the Executive Board, take care of all correspondence and press releases, edit the Alumni News, send out notices of meetings and perform other duties as may be recommended by the Exec. Board.
(f) The Treasurer shall have charge of the funds of the Association and shall deposit same in a Branch of such Chartered Bank as may be determined by the Executive Board. He and the President shall be the signing officers of the Association. The Treasurer shall present an audited financial states when the Annual Meeting He shall perform such other duties as may be ment at the Annual Meeting He shall perform such other duties as may be ment at the Annual Meeting. He shall perform such other duties as may be assigned by the Executive Board.

#### shall be amended to read:

(A) (4) (e) The General Secretary shall be appointed by the Executive Board. He or she shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the Association and of the Executive Board, take care of all correspondence and press releases, edit the Alumni News. send out notices of meetings, have charge of the funds of the Association and shall deposit same in a branch of such Chartered Bank as may be determined by the Executive Board. The President, the First Vice-President and the General Secretary shall be the signing officers of the Association. The General Secretary shall perform such other duties as may be assigned by the Executive Board. Executive Board.

In order to bring the constitution up-to-date with current practice, the following amendment is recommended:

#### ARTICLE VII. Meetings of the Association (C) which now reads

### TOMMY' McLEOD NAMED DEAN

Dr. T. H. McLeod '40, dean of Commerce at the University of Saskatchewan since 1952, has been appointed dean of the College of Arts and Science at Regina Campus, effective May 15. Since his graduation Dr. McLeod has earned the reputation of an outstanding Canadian administrator in his positions with the Saskatchewan government and the University of Saskatchewan, and as a member of various boards and commissions.

Recent overseas assignments included his 1961 Ford Foundation appointment as chief consultant to the Turkish government on a project involving the cengovernment planning agency.
