Word has just been received of the death in Brandon on September 25 of Dr. A. E. McKenzie, Honorary Chairman of the Board of Directors of Brandon College, and long-time friend and supporter of the College.

Dr. McKenzie's energy and foresight were instrumental in ensuring the College's re-establishment in 1938 and in helping to guide the College's progress to date. The A. E. McKenzie Foundation has provided continuing financial support for the educational centre which Dr. McKenzie has, over the years, envisioned for Brandon.

His funeral is being held September 28 from the J. R. C. Evans Theatre adjoining the Arts and Library Building, which bears the official name of Albert Edward McKenzie Building in honor of the College's departed friend and benefactor.

## Outstanding Musicians Join **Brandon College Faculty**

Albert Pratz, distinguished Canadian concert violinist and teacher has this fall joined the Faculty of the Brandon College School of Music. Mr. Pratz has built an international reputation as soloist, conductor, concert master and as a performer in chamber music. His name is associated with CBC, NBC and BBC performances, Celebrity Artist Series, and Royal Conservatory of Toronto Faculty and Board of Examiners to mention but a few. Prof. Pratz' numerous students now hold key positions in many sym-phony orchestras in the United States and Canada, and include most of the violin section of the Toronto symphony.

Also participating in activities of the Brandon College School of Music for the first time is Dr. Merton Utgaard, founder and director of the International Music Camp at Bottineau, N.D. Dr. Utgaard travels to Brandon one day each week, providing private instruction in brass, and sharing his knowledge and experience in the field of conducting and orchestration with students in the Bachelor of Music course. Dr. Utgaard has had a broad background in the teaching of both vocal and instrumental music on the elementary, secondary and college level. During the summer of 1962 and again in 1964 he served as director of the International Music Camp European Tour Band which presented good-will concerts in Europe, Canada and the United States.

## 1964's Landmark

Soon to be officially opened is the latest addition to Brandon College—the Physical Education building on the southwest corner of Louise Avenue and Twentieth Street. It promises to be a proud addition to the campus and is all but ready

for occupancy.

Details on its financing show that it has been necessary to borrow substantially in order to erect this much-needed building this year. Alumni contributions to date have totalled \$11,589 from 154 members. An appeal is made, especially to graduates of more recent years, to seriously consider the Alumni commitment to help in a special way with the cost of this building. Today's students have contributed \$16,000. They and tomorrow's students are counting on YOU!

# Scholars Receive Recognition

Scholarship Night, featuring performances by scholarship winners from the School of Music, will be held this year on Wednesday, October 21 in the J. R. C. Evans Lecture Theatre.

This year more than 45 Arts, Science and Education students whose 1963-64 marks were over 75% will receive individual subject and aggregate awards. As

shown in the College calendar, many citizens have made subject awards available. In addition, a Certificate of Merit is presented to the student with highest mark over 75% in any subject for which there is no monetary award.

During the past few years greater emphasis has been placed on entrance scholarships to the College. Students entering with an 80% average and maintaining a 75% average in their years here have received \$300 in each year of attendance at the College. This year 16 entering students have qualified for these scholarships

scholarships.

## **New Non-Credit Courses** Available

In addition to the University of Manitoba credit-granting extension courses normally offered, Brandon College is making new evening courses available this year in Guidance, Oral French and Conversational Spanish and Italian.

The Testing and Guidance course has been prepared by the Psychology Department and consists of a seminar program, divided into three sections. Any one or combination of the three parts may be taken. They are: Educational Guidance (held on Friday evenings and Saturdays in October), Vocational Guidance (held in January) and Personal Guidance (held in March).

The beginners' class in oral French will

be offered, if there is sufficient demand. using the new St. Cloud method that has proven so successful in summer sessions this year and last. Two class meetings weekly are proposed.

The conversational Spanish or Italian is for persons interested in beginning the study of either language and will be offered if there is demand for it.

## Athletics Under New Direction

Former students who have, over the years, been responsible for organization of athletic activities will be interested in knowing of the formation last spring of a Brandon College Athletic Directorate.

It consists of the College President or his nominee (Chairman); the Head of the Department of Physical Education; two representatives of the Faculty or Administration to be appointed by the Board of Directors; one representative of the Brandon College Alumni Association, appointed by that Association; the Sennior Stick; one male and one female representative from the Brandon College Students' Association, appointed by the Executive of the Association.

Under the authority of the Board of Directors and subject to the approval of the President, the Directorate controls and administers all competitive and recreational athletics available to members of the student body of Brandon College. The Directorate has full control and direction over all facilities of Brandon College available for athletics and recreation.

Alumni representative appointed to the Directorate is Don Sumner, Class of

Director of Athletics, Prof. J. M. Marshall, is assisted by newly-appointed as-

sistant Miss Yvonne Tremblay and coach Nick Haraszthy. The College is this year re-entering the Western Canada Intercollegiate Athletic Association, and has been accepted as an associate member.

# "SHERWOOD FOX OF WESTERN" AND BRANDON

## A Review by DR. JOHN E. ROBBINS

Brandon College is proud of its sixty-five years of history, and rightly so. It's a fairly lengthy history, as histories go in the West. No university west of Winnipeg has one as long.

All the more remarkable, then, that one of Brandon's first teachers has just published a book \* of remiliscences in which he recalls the days of his career at Brandon College, 1900-09. And these are not the nostalgic chatter of an aging man, but a lively, coherent and constructive account of one of Canada's most interesting academic careers.

Sherwood Fox came to Brandon at age 22, fresh from graduation at McMaster University and a summer in Quebec to improve his French. His coming here was not sheer accident. His father was a Baptist clergyman, and his grand-parents on his mother's side, Mr. and Mrs. William Davies of Toronto, with whom he lived for several years as a schoolboy in Toronto, were staunch Baptists, supporting good works of the church, near and far. Without substantial contributions from the profits of their meat-packing business (the first unit, incidentally, of the present Canada Packers) the first building of Brandon College might never have been built. (Every student of the College for many years must have seen the large oil portraits of Grandfather and Grandmother Davies hanging in the chapel.)

The young professor had majored in Classics and could speak both French and German. His assignment would daunt the most enterprising college teacher of today. "I was charged with directing the courses in Greek, Latin and French at both the high school and undergraduate levels, as well as the courses in German, should any student chance to elect that subject." Classes were conducted on the third floor of a building at Rosser Avenue and Eighth Street, until the 18th Street building was ready in 1901. Though it was not formally affiliated with the University of Manitoba, the College prepared its students for the Manitoba events. lege prepared its students for the Manitoba exams.

In the first year Professor Fox lived in the home of President McDiarmid, and after this year of sizing-up, the President put him in the new residence (third floor of the tower) to live with the boys. (One of the boys eventually became Lieutenant Governor of Alberta, the Honorable John

C. Bowen.)

After two years Fox was given two years of leave for graduate study, one of which he spent at the University of Geneva and one at Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore. Then he returned to Brandon for five years, 1904-09. He moved about a good deal in the western part of Manitoba, considering that these were pre-automobile days, and a young lady he met at Pipestone in 1901, Julia McKinnon, pecame his wife in 1906. They built a house near the College, and here in 1907 their elder daughter was born.

In 1909 hox again went on leave, to complete his graduate studies at Johns Hopkins, but this time he did not return. Doctorate complete, he accepted an assistant professorship at Princeton University, where he remained until 1917. That year he accepted the headship of the Department of Classics at the University of Western Ontario, became Dean of Arts and Science in 1919, and President in 1928,

which office he held until retirement in 1947.

The story of Western's rise to front-rank university status under his leadership is ably told, including its elevation in 1929 to the senior intercollegiate football league with Toronto, Queen's and McGill! It was another of Dr. Fox's enterprises in these early years to which, I think, I owe my first meeting with him—the establishment of a most successful French language Summer School at Trois Pistoles for English speaking students. In 1935 he was given an honorary LL.D. by the University of Ottawa, in part at least, I'm sure, for his imaginative promotion of the study of French, the native tongue of one of his paternal forbears. At the same convocation I received a Ph.D. Dr. Fox met my recently acquired wife, and from that day forward he has always given me high marks for having married, like his great-great grandfather in 1779, a French-Canadian girl.
Dr. Fox's publishing has not been limited to Classics

and education. Throughout life, he has been an ardent botanist, naturalist and fisherman, and these interests have provided the themes for several books he has written in retirement. His **The Bruce Beckons** has recently been published by the University of Toronto Press in a sixth, paperback

edition.

Snerwood Fox has not forgotten Brandon. It was here that he tried his wings at teaching and decided that he liked it. It was here that he established the basis of a long and happy marriage. Of every new book that he writes, he sends a copy to the College library. And he keeps himself informed of every new development. Neither can we forget his substantial contribution to the good name of the College in those early years.
