EDUCATION BUILDING - A WORTHY ADDITION

The proposed New Education Building is to be located on the campus between Clark Hall and the Music Building. It is designed to provide the most up-to-date facilities for teacher training and continuation studies. The building is designed for an enrolment of 300 students and will be three stories high. Provision in the structure for a future fourth floor allows for substantial expansion as the enrolment grows.

The building comprises of a series of specialized teaching areas grouped as closely as possible around a library-resource centre that occupies a large part of the main floor. Surrounding the resource centre on the main floor are administration offices, the social studies laboratory and primary methods section. This latter area will include a working model kindergarten.

The top floor has space for music instruction, complete with a specially designed music classroom and several practise rooms, a language section with specialized French and English Speech classroom and a fully equipped 36 place Language Laboratory. Also located on the top floor will be the mathematics section and several general purpose classrooms. These facilities will be grouped around a 160 seat lecture theatre which is designed to provide the widest possible range of uses including group use for music and drama as well as for lectures to larger classes. The Science Department, which consist of three fully

equipped laboratories and related facilities will be located on the lower floor along with the art department and audio visual section. A special feature of the audio visual section, which will distribute films to all faculties on the campus as well as to the community, will be a fully equipped 90 seat motion picture theatre Space is also allotted on this floor for the future installation of equipment for a closed circuit T.V. system.

In addition, a number of facilities are to be provided to make the building as useful as possible for both faculty and students. These will include a faculty lounge, student locker rooms, and student lounges at several locations in the building. In addition, a large exhibition-display area will be located on the lower floor These facilities are combined with academic areas in a manner intended to create the most pleasant possible surroundings for the day long, year round use for which the building is intended.

In Section (C) change 'January' to Oc tober and 'February' to November so that this section will now read "(C) The Nominating Committee shall have it, first meeting not later than the 19th day of October and shall submit its report to the secretary not later than the last day of November."

In Section (D) change the word 'spring' to December so that it will now read in part: "shall be published in the December issue of the ALUMNI NEWS



GOVERNOR-GENERAL AND PRESIDENT

The fall of 1912 was a notable one in the history of Brandon College. It was visited by a Royal Governor-General, the Duke of Connaught, and it also welcomed a new president, Dr Howard P Whidden.

It was on Wednesday, Oct. 16 that the third son of Queen Victoria, who was visiting in the west with the Duchess and their daughter. Princess Patricia, staved off at Brandon He was born at Buckingham Pal-ace on May 1st. 1850, and after a distinguished military career had been appointed in 1911 to succeed Earl Grey as Governor-General of Canada.

When the ducal party arrived at the college at 11:15 it was a beautiful fall morning. They were received at the en-trance of Clark Hall, and an address of welcome was read by the senior member of the staff, Dr S. J. McKee The Duchess re-

ceived a bouquet and a Clark Hall pin was presented to Princess Patricia by Muriel McCamis of Class of '13. The writer happened to be chair-man of the Students' Committee, now called the Senior Stick and led the student body in the charrier Stick, and led the student body in its cheering.

Two years later the First Great War broke out, and a new regiment was formed in Canada that achieved a proud record. It was given the name of the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry.

The Baptist Association of Western Canada decided in 1899 to build a college in Brandon, and it was erected the following year. Dr. A. P. McDiarmid was called from Ontario to become the first president; and for the next 12 years spent his strength and talent in building up the young college, and in this was splendidly supported by Dr. S J. McKee Dr McKee, together with Dr. Crawford, had conducted

an academy at Rapid City, which then expected the C.P.R. to go through it After the railway was routed through Brandon, Dr. McKee moved the academy into the new city. When the Baptists chose Brandon as the site for the new college, Dr. McKee, a staunch Baptist, turned in his academy as a nucleus for the young institution. Dr McDiarmid's health later declined and in 1912 he was forced to resign. He bought a little "Sabine farm" at Robson BC, and his health was

largely restored for some years Dr H P Whidden had taught English in the young college earlier, but had then gone back into the ministry He had served for some years a Baptist church at Dayton, Ohio, but the College Board now offered him the vacant position of president, which he accepted. On Friday, Nov. 15, he was installed in the Brandon Baptist Church to his new office As chairman of the Students' Committee the present writer had frequently to consult with the new president and learned to appriciate him highly

In 1917 Dr Whidden was elected as M P. for the Bran-don constituency with one of the largest majorities in the country He did excellent work in the Union Government of Sir Robert Borden until the war was over. The position of Chancellor of McMaster University, with which Brandon Col-lege had been affiliated, was offered to him in 1823 and he accepted Dr Whidden died on March 30, 1952

Brandon College is again active in its fall work, with a greatly enlarged student body, teaching staff, and new buildings Many of the student body of 1912 and earlier are no longer with us But those who remain still remember vivid-ly when we welcomed to the college the Governor-General, the Duke of Connaught, and the new President, Dr. Howard P. Whidden.

Editor's Note — Thanks goes to Dr Harvey '13 for his timely description of the exciting events October 16, 1912 It is, indeed, gratifying to have among us an alumnus whose vivid recollection goes back to the very beginnings of our college

Mr. H. P. Constans, Assistant Professor, Faculty of Education has returned from attending the annual meeting of the Northwest Philosophy of Education So-ciety, held at Western Washington State College. Bellingham, Washington, U.S.A

At this meeting Professor Constans delivered one of the six papers presented to 75 participants from the U.S. North-west and the four Western Canadian provinces. The title of the talk was: "Toward a Canadian Philosophy of Higher Education (with special reference to Manitoba)."
