Commencement Date Changed to May 31 Commencement Ball on Friday, May 28 - Luncheon on Saturday

A number of factors, chief of which is the anticipated visit of Their Excellencies, The Governor General and Mme. Georges P. Vanier to Brandon, have led to the decision to hold the Commencement ceremony for graduates in Arts, Science and Education on the afternoon of Monday, May 31 in the new College Gymnasium. This will be the first public function of the College to be held in the new building, which is capable of seating more than 1500 people.

Some sixty students are expected to receive degrees in Arts or Science, and twenty to receive diplomas or degrees in Education. Both the Governor General and the Lieutenant-Governor are expected to see the students graduate.

Commencement speaker will be Dr. Roy Daniells, head of the Department of English in the University of British Columbia. In coming to Brandon Dr. Daniells will be returning to a city he knows well. Before going

to the University of British Columbia in 1946 he was for nine years head of the Department of English in the University of Manitoba and frequently visited Brandon where Miss Laurenda Francis, who became his wife in 1948, was employed.

Prof. Daniells graduated first from the University of British Columbia and pursued postgraduate studies at the University of Toronto, where he received the M.A. and Ph.D. degrees. He has published two volumes of poetry and in 1963 a book on the English poet John Milton. In 1964 he was awarded honorary degrees by Queen's University and the University of Toronto. He is a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada.

UNIVERSITY GOLD MEDAL COMES TO BRANDON COLLEGE

News has just been received that Lyle A. Poole of Manson, Manitoba, is the holder of the highest average in Arts and Science (General Course) of any graduating student in the University of Manitoba or its affiliated colleges. A science student, Lyle will be the first Brandon College graduate to win the University Gold Medal since 1956, when Marina Townsend of Nesbitt received this honour. The medal will be presented at the Commencement Exercises on the 31st.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

Need for the following proposed revisions has become evident in discussion at executive meetings. They will be presented for your vote at the annual meeting.

Article VII

- (A) that the section "The Annual Meeting shall be held in May each year and if possible in connecnection with the Convocation exercises" be replaced by, "The Annual Meeting shall be held in January of each year, to coincide with the fiscal year."
- (C) that 'one to be the Annual Meeting in May' be replaced by 'one to be the Annual Meeting in January', the clause then reading, "The Association shall hold each year at least two general meetings, one to be the Annual Meeting in January."

DR. ROBBINS NAMED TO BOARD

The Sun Publishing Company of Brandon recently announced appointment of Brandon College President John E. Robbins to their seven-member Board of Directors. Dr. Robbins is no stranger to the publishing field — The 10-volume Encyclopedia Canadiana stands as evidence of some of his years of writing and editing experience.

His contribution as a director of the **Sun** will serve as a further bond between 'College and community', as Brandon College assumes an expanding role in Western Manitoba.

A Nuffield Foundation Fellowship for three months' overseas study will take Lucien Needham, Associate Professor of Voice, Organ and Theory in the Brandon College School of Music, to England this summer. There he will be enabled to carry out a program of advanced study, research and consultation with leading musicians.

Assistant Prof. J. M. Marshall, Physical Education Director, has been appointed Chairman of the Canadian School Health Committee a committee of the Canadian Health Education Specialist Society.

Donaid N. Adams of the College Chemistry department has been selected as one of fifty participants in a Summer Institute for college chemistry teachers, sponsored by the United States National Science Foundation. The group will attend Oregon State University at Corvallis, Oregon.



COLLEAGUES HONOUR PROFESSOR PERRY

Fellow faculty members gathered recently at a dinner to honour Prof. Edward Perry and to make a presentation to him on the occasion of his retirement from full-time duties as Head of the English Department at Brandon College.

Since they came to Brandon in 1944, Prof. Perry and his wife Alma have been noted for the emphasis which they place on things artistic, things antique and historic. In these Prof. Perry sees the background of English literature, and rich indeed is the student or colleague who has shared the period furniture of the Perry's home and the warmth of Prof. Perry's intellectual discussions.

For the immediate future Prof. Perry plans to carry lighter teaching duties in the College's English Department. Head of the Department will be Dr. R. F. B. King, who came to Brandon College from Royal Roads in 1963, and who is Associate Dean of Arts at Brandon College.



THE BRANDON COLLEGE GYMNASIUM where Commencement will be held at 2:30 on the afternoon of May 31


NEW SCHOLARSHIPS ESTABLISHED

Prominent in the new scholarships listed in the 1965-66 Brandon College calendar will be one provided in perpetuity by the College's former Director of Music, Dr. W. L. Wright of Robson, B.C., and two annual awards provided by 1928 graduate, Miss Meta E. Mischpeter of Nipawin, Saskatchewan.

The William L. and Annie Evans Wright Scholarship of \$100 in English pays particular tribute to the years of devoted teaching of Mrs. Wright in the Brandon College Department of English, and its mention will bring many fond memori-s to Brandon College graduates of that time.

In memory of her parents Miss Mischpeter has made available the August J. Mischpeter Memorial Scholarship of \$100 in Geography and the Emma Ward-Mischpeter Memorial Scholarship of \$100 in Voice.

Other contributors to date of new scholarships are: Mr. H. V. Vidal, Assistant Professor of Classics at Brandon College — a \$50 award in Introductory Latin and a Senior Classics Scholarship of \$100; The Manitoba Hydro Prize of \$100 for second year Chemistry, provided by Manitoba Hydro, whose chief chemists in Brandon and Winnipeg are Brandon College graduates.

In his introductory remarks, Mr. D. R. MacKay drew attention to the very pleasing arrangement of trees and shrubs which have resulted from the early landscaping efforts of the late P. A. Kennedy with the assistance of the Brandon Lions' Club.


