#### ENROLMENT UP AT BRANDON COLLEGE

At the end of registration week, 452 full-time students have registered for Arts and Science courses, as compared with 405 last year. The Bachelor of Music course has enrolled 24 this year, where there were

The training course for high school teachers has 20 in place of 16 last year, and the course for elementary teachers 168 instead of 160. The Extension Courses this year attracted 167 students to register, whereas 144 registered last year.

In addition there is the enrolment in music conservatory courses, which is approximately 300.

Lucien Needham, Professor of Voice and Organ at Brandon College, has received notice of being made a Fellow of the Guilhall School of Music in London. The constitution of the School limits its fellowship to one hundred members, and Prof. Needham is given the honour as a former student for his successful musical work in Canada.

Prof. Needham spent three months in the United Kingdom during the past summer, at the Guildhall School and other musical centres. For this purpose he received a travel grant from the Nuf-

field Foundation.

In his university teaching and administration career Dr. McLeish was Assistant Professor of Education at the University of British Columbia from 1951 to 1954. From the University of British Columbia he moved to Carlton University where he stayed for the next ten years. During that time he was Registrar (and subsequently Director of Summer School), and Research Associate

Professor of Education.

Dr. McLeish was chief book reviewer for the Montreal Gazette, 1944-46 and acted as contributing editor in 1947. He has appeared in the CBC Citizen's Forum and Tabloid trans-Canada telecasts, and on Town Meeting in Canada. He produced and took part in thirty educational radio broadcasts over Station CFCF,

Montreal, and elsewhere.

MEET DR. NAIDU OF THE POLITICAL SCIENCE DEPARTMENT

Dr. Naidu is from Hyderabad, India, where he took the degrees of B.A. (Hist. & Econ.), M.A. (Pol.Sc.), LL.B (Law) and LL.M (Constitutional Law and Jurisprudence) from Osmania University. Later he took his Ph.D (International Relations) from the University of Minnesota. Before coming to Brandon Dr. Naidu has had eight years teaching experience. He taught at Osmania University, University of Minnesota and Minto State College. He has published, besides a number of articles, two books — "The City of Secunderabad" (published in India in 1955) and "An Invitation to Think" (published in New York, 1965). He has two other voluminous works almost ready for publication: one, "UN Force: Legal Theory and Political Practice" dealing with the problem of UN military forces, the other, "Political Executive in Federal political comparative study of Federal political comparative study of Federal political executives in the federation of U.S.A, Canada, Switzerland, Australia, South Africa, U.S.S.R., and India.

A series of his articles on the Kashmir

conflict has been recently published in

The Brandon Sun.

Dr. Naidu is scheduled to deliver for the Extension Division during January-February, 1966, a series of four lectures on "Makes of Modern India: Tagore,

Gyandhi, Nehru and Shastri."

Dr. Naidu was in U.S.A. on a Fulbright Exchange Programme. Last summer he went on a world tour visiting Seattle, San Francisco, Los Angeles and Hono-lulu, in the U.S.A. and in Japan, Formosa, Hong Kong, The Phillippines, Viet Nam, Cambodia, Thailand, India, Cairo, Beirut, Geneva, Paris, London, Dublin, Shannon, Montreal, and Ottawa.

He arrived in Brandon on August 6, 1965. Earlier in 1956, Dr. Naidu had toured, in the capacity of the representative of Indian youth, Switzerland. Germany, Poland. Bulgaria, U.S.S.R., China, Hong Kong, Singapore, Malaya, and Ceylon.

Among a number of honors received by Dr. Naidu are the Fulbright Grant, The John Cowles Fellowship, The Minne. sota Graduate School Special Grant, The American Political Science Assoc. Travel Grants, and the McKnight Foundation's Special Research Grant.

#### RUTH CHANG - ORIENTAL MISS STUDIES MUSIC

The following appeared in the September 13, 1965 issue of The Brandon Sun. Miss Chang was interviewed by Mr. Neil Louttit of The Sun

When Ruth Chang was four years old, she and her family arrived in Hong Kong from the Chinese mainland.

Today, 19-yer-old Miss Chang is studying for her Bachelor of Music degree at Brandon College.

In a soft oriental voice, Miss Chang explained why she travelled nearly half way around the world to come to Brandon.

She said the Brandon College School of Music was recommended to her by the Taiwan (Chinese Nationalist) department of education.

"I asked at the department of education what Canadian Universities offered degrees in music," she said. "I was told there were two schools to which I could apply, one in Toronto and Brandon College."

"I chose Brandon College because it offered subjects similar to those I had previously studied," Miss Chang said.

She has studied music for three years at Tsing Hua University. She will be taking first year at Brandon College and will major in piano.

She said several young people leave Hong Kong every year to study abroad

"Many go to America, Britain, Canada. Australia and Germany," she said "I came to Canada because it is easier to get a job when I return to Hong Kong if I have studied in the British Commonwealth."

Miss Chang, who had been here less than 24 hours, said she liked what she had seen of Brandon.

"It is a good city. It is small, but I think I will like it. The people are very kind"

Miss Chang was amazed by the manner in which North American cities were laid out

"We have no gardens in Hong Kong People live mostly in apartment blocks,"

she said, indicating with her hands that everything was crowded in Hong Kong.

"There are over 4,000,000 people in Hong Kong," she said (total land area of Hong Kong is 391 square miles). Miss Chang said it takes 80 minutes by train to get from her home to downtown Hong Kong.

Miss Chang told of the education system in her homeland.

"Students in Hong Kong work very hard." she said. "At the end of the Fifth Fo:m (comparable to Manitoba High school) exams are written. If a student fails it is almost impossible for him to find a good job."

She said students wishing to enter uni-

versity must complete a Sixth Form which is divided into two parts and takes two years to complete.

Miss Chang said she had studied English for five years in school but had never spoken it to any extent.

"In Hong Kong we never speak English, she explained. "I have only been speaking it for two days."

Miss Chang said she was financing her own way through university. She taught kindergarten in Hong Kong for a year to get enough money to come to Brandon.

"I want to get a part time job to help meet my expenses," she said.

The only dissatisfaction Miss Chang showed in her new surroundings was a longing for her home.

"I am very lonely," she said quietly, "very lonely."



Ruth Chang arrived in Brandon to study for her Bachelor of Music degree at Brandon College. Miss Chang, who comes from Hong Kong, said Brandon College recommended to her by the Taiwan department of education in Hong Kong.

She has studied piano at an advanced level for three years.

## EDUCATION BUILDING NEXT

Manitoba Premier, Duff Roblin, announced September 30, at a Brandon College luncheon that sod will soon be turned to begin construction on a new Education Building at Brandon College. The building will be a \$750,000 venture and will facilitate 300 students destined to become teachers.

The location of the new structure will be just north of the present Administration Building which has been

with us since 1900.

Dr Robbins, in thanking the Premier, pointed out that the College prided themselves in an Education Faculty second to none and the new Education Building will be second to none in the facilities it will offer Facilities will be provided in the new building to enable the latest and most up-to-date teaching methods to be presented. Dr. Robbins explained that should there arise a need for more space, the construction of this building will be such that another storey may be added.
