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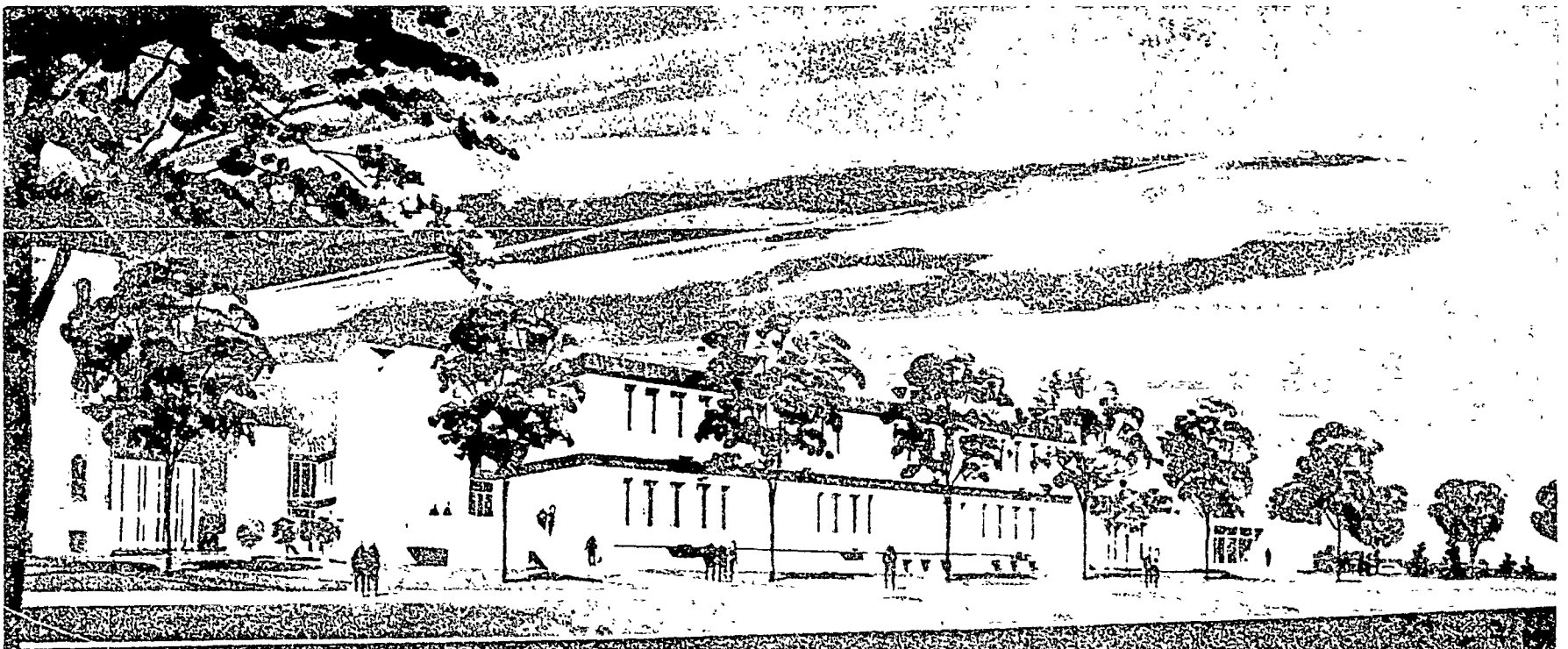

Commencement to be Held May 28

Saturday afternoon, May 28th, in the Physical Education Building some fifty students will receive degrees in Arts or Science and over twenty will receive diplomas or degrees in Education.

This year it is expected that the first graduate of the Bachelor of Music degree program will receive his degree. He is Mr. Jack Spalding, originally from Miniota, Manitoba, now living in Brandon.

Commencement speaker this year will be Dr. W. L. Morton, Provost, University College, Manitoba. Dr. Morton is Professor of History at University College.



NEW EDUCATION BUILDING

CONTRACT LET FOR EDUCATION BUILDING

Work on a new building for the Faculty of Education at Brandon College began during the week of April 20th 1965. Mr. W. F. McGregor, Chairman of the Brandon College Board of Directors, has announced that the contract for construction has been awarded to Pearson Construction Company for \$792,000. Equipment and furniture will bring the total cost of the new project to over \$900,000.

The building will be a three-storey structure located between Clark Hall and the Music Building, facing on 18th Street. It has been designed by Smith, Carter, Searle and Associates, to accommodate 300 students, and to permit the addition of a fourth storey as enrolment grows.

The planners of the new building have given priority to current innovations in elementary and secondary education. Provision is made for the production and use of various teaching aids such as slides, transparencies and maps. A resource center, library and reading room complex will incorporate the best thinking on learning and instruction in elementary and high schools.

The trends in teaching science based on recent research are evident in the facilities planned for the science area. Added emphasis will be given to the significance of the multi-sensory approach, generalization, learning by discovery, and individual and group projects. **Continued on Page 3**

AMERICAN ALUMNI COUNCIL ACCEPTS BRANDON MEMBERSHIP

Brandon College Alumni Association, as of March 28, 1966 is a Member of the American Alumni Council. This was confirmed in a letter from Mr. George J. Cooke, Jr., Executive Director of A.A.C. to the General Secretary.

The A.A.C., with headquarters in Washington, D.C., dates back to 1913 when the first of its parent organizations, the Association of Alumni Secretaries, was formed. Later associations were Alumni Magazines Associated, and the Association of Alumni Funds. In 1927 the American Alumni Council was formed from a combination of the previous associations.

The major purpose is "to mobilize behind education the full strength of organized Alumni support in all of its spiritual, moral and practical manifestations." The individuals designated as Member-Representatives under the institutional headings are, for the most part, Alumni administrators, fund directors, development officers, publications editors and other administrative officers with related responsibilities.

As a service organization, the Council aims to help these representatives to increase their professional competence, and to raise the level of effectiveness of all programs involving Alumni. The end result is to make the interest of Alumni in their own institutions more meaningful and to develop increased understanding and support of education at all levels.

Of special interest to us as Canadians or Alumni of a Canadian College is the fact that the Canadian Branch of A.A.C. is, itself, becoming quite active. A group of Canadians representing Canadian institutions at the A.A.C. Conference in Atlantic City last year, though it would be a good idea to have a Canadian Alumnors Newsletter whereby Alumni Administrators could keep in touch with other Canadian Alumni Administrators, share ideas, help one another and keep generally informed. Your General Secretary is proud to be in possession of both Newsletters printed to date.

In evidence of the fact that the Canadian Alumnors is a good, active group we are quoting from the letter of Mr. George J. Cooke, Jr., Executive Director of the American Alumni Council to Mr. Tim Hollick-Kenyon of the University of British Columbia, who edited the second issue of our Alumnors Magazine. Mr. Cooke writes, "Apart from being informative to me and other men in the Central Office, this (our Newsmagazine) is a very good thing to have in our library — as an example for our own Districts. More power to you gentlemen up there — in countless ways I am getting the impression that the folks below the border will have to move to keep up with you."

Your editor, for one, wishes this impression to continue.

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Brandon College School of Music Announces Second Summer Session

The School of Music, Brandon College, has announced plans for its Second Summer Session, July 4 - 9, 1966.

Offerings in piano, strings, voice, and choral music (school music and choral conducting) will be presented by four internationally well-known musicians.

Albert Pratz, noted violinist and faculty member of Brandon College, will coach sessions in chamber music, orchestral repertoire, and conduct string quartet master classes.

Denis Matthews, British pianist, who returns for his second season, will give lecture-recitals and conduct class sessions of interest to piano teachers.

Aksel Schiotz, well-known Danish baritone, will conduct vocal classes and give a lecture-recital.

Wayne Riddell, choral conductor of Montreal, returns to conduct sessions of interest to the school music teacher and choir director.

Peggy A. Sharpe, Supervisor of the Conservatory Department, is chairman of the Summer Session Programme, **Professor Lorne Watson** is the Director of the School.

For the first time courses leading to permanent certification for elementary teachers will be given at Brandon College. The two selected for 1966 are Early Childhood Education and Physical Education for Elementary Grades.

If a sufficient demand appears, both Education P.S.S.C. Physics and Chem Study will be offered.

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First Hurd Memorial Lecture Given By Professor J. C. Falardeau of Quebec

On April 2nd in the Dr. J. R. C. Evans Lecture Theatre Jean-Charles Falardeau, a distinguished professor of Laval University, Quebec, presented the first lecture in what is expected to be an annual series by French Canadian scholars.

Professor Falardeau is a past president of the Social Science Research Council of Canada and of the Canadian Political Science Association, and a member of the Royal Society of Canada. One of the early graduates of Father Levesques Faculty of Social Science at Laval in the 1930's, the young Falardeau pursued graduate studies at the University of Chicago and returned to Quebec where he soon became the best known French Canadian sociologist.

This and the lectures to follow are made possible by the Burton and Ruth Hurd Memorial Fund. This fund was created last year by donations to perpetuate the memory of Professor W. Burton Hurd, Dean of Arts at Brandon College before 1935, and his wife, Ruth Winkler Hurd. The purpose of the fund is to promote the study of French language and culture at the College.

Present plans provide for the future installation of a closed-circuit television system. The large lecture hall can be converted into a small theatre with lighting board, spots and an area for a thrust stage for the training in drama of elementary and secondary teachers. A language laboratory will meet the needs of foreign language students and of those who require special help in speech improvement.

Dr. R. W. Brockway, Assoc. Professor of Religious Studies and History, is a member of a committee writing a history of the United States for Canadian High Schools for Dent Ltd. Dr. Brockway is planning a tour of U.S.S.R. during June.

Doctors Virgil and Lillian Logan of the Brandon College Faculty of Education were in Chicago during the first week of April participating in the Annual Conference of the Association for Childhood Education.

Dr. Perdue '28, Dean of Science, has been named to the Board of Trustees of the Wildlife Foundation of Manitoba which was incorporated recently by the Manitoba Legislature. Purpose of the foundation is to provide facilities and financing for education in the science and art of wildlife conservation.

Mr. J. M. Marshall will give a paper

at the 57th Annual Meeting of the Canadian Public Health Association in Quebec City to be held May 31 to June 2. Topic of the paper is "School Health Education Today."

Dr. E. J. Tyler '46, Professor of Psychology, was again Conference Consultant at the 1966 Alberta Seminars for Youth sponsored by the Government of Alberta. One conference was held in Calgary May 6th and 7th and another in Edmonton May 13th and 14th. This marks the 9th year that Dr. Tyler has assisted with such a program.

Dr. Walter Rodewald, Head of the Department of Chemistry, has been awarded a grant of \$3,000 from the National Research Council of Canada. His research project is concerned with the determination of iron complexes of aromatic acids in aqueous solutions and the evaluation of their formation constants.

This project involves the determination of physical properties of organic molecules and the effects of temperature and environmental changes upon them.
