University for Brandon - Next July 1st

Dr. John Robbins, president of Brandon College, informed us that the Council on Higher Learning has recommended to the Manitoba Government that the college become a university.

Dr. Robbins expects an order-in-council, which would set the date for the college becoming independent, to be passed this fall. "A reasonable target date for university status," said Dr. Robbins, "might be July 1st, 1967."

The provincial government, after receiving the council's recommendation, set a two-month waiting period to hear the views of the University of Manitoba and its affiliated colleges.

The university senate has already approved of our becoming a university, and under the Universities Enabling Act passed last spring, only an order-incouncil is required to proclaim the college a univer-

Dr. George Johnson, Education Minister, has said that although university senate approval has been received on the recommendation, it will not be passed on to the cabinet until all replies from the colleges are in. Although the colleges could not veto the recommendations, the replies would be carefully considered in reaching a decision.



STANDING OVATIONS GIVEN AT COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES

Commencement Exercises for 1966 were held for the second time in the College Gymnasium. Nearly 1,000 persons were on hand to witness 37 students receive the B.A. degree, 24 the B.Sc. degree, 5 B.Ed. degree and 1 (the first) B.Mus. degree. At the same time 18 students received high school teaching certificates after completing Education I. This was last May 28 when Dr. W. L. Morton was commencement speaker.

Pride rose high as standing ovations were given by fellow students to two award winning graduates. Miss Donna Firby '65 won the Manitoba Government Gold Medal for the highest marks in the training course for secondary teachers given in the Faculty of Education of the province. Miss Firby also won the Brandon College Education General Proficiency Gold Medal.

Miss Barbara Broadfoot received a well earned standing ovation as she accepted the University of Manitoba Gold Medal for highest marks in Arts and Science in the University of Manitoba system. In addition to this. Miss Broadfoot, a native of Gladstone, walked off with the Brandon College Lieutenant-Governor's Gold Medal along with five Silver Medals. Silver Medals for highest marks over 80% were won by Miss Broadfoot in Chemistry, Economics, Mathematics and Zoology. Miss Broadfoot is now employed with International Business Machines (IBM) in Winnipeg.

SUMMER SCHOOL ENROLS 300

Some 162 students registered this summer for university credit courses in English, Geography, History, Political Science and Psychology.

The two courses for teachers, organized by the Department of Education, were very popular. Miss Betty Gibson found 72 students in her Early Childhood Education course and Mr. Peter Dobson directed 46 in Psysical Education.

A four-week Oral French course was offered again for the fourth summer and attracted 18. Professor Yvonne Champigneul of McGill University was in charge and was assisted by Miss Carole Marcelle of Brandon and Miss Carole Paintin '64.

JUNE CALLWOOD SPEAKS Teacher Training Graduates AT TEACHER TRAINING GRADUATION

On Saturday, June 11, completion of training for some 160 teachers at Brandon College was marked by graduation exercises in the college gymnasium.

The address to the graduates was given by June Callwood (Mrs. Trent Frayne), well-known journalist and broadcaster from Toronto.

Mrs. Frayne on leaving high school in Brantford, Ontario, worked first for daily newspapers, but for some years has written feature articles for various national magazines. She was a ghostwriter for Dr. Marion Hilliard's "A Woman Doctor Looks at Life and Love" and wrote a book of her own, "Love, Hate, Fear and Anger."

Broadcast audiences know her mainly for radio's Court of Opinion and her appearances on television's Front Page Challenge.

Mrs. Frayne is the mother of four children, ranging in ages from 21 to 4. Her husband was raised in Brandon and attended Brandon College. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. M. H. Frayne, still reside in Brandon.

ENROLMENT INCREASE AUGURS WELL

With registration almost complete, enrolment in Arts and Science at the College has shown the greatest increase of any faculty, with 584 students (400 Arts, 184 Science) registering, as opposed to 483 at this time last year. This does not include the extension course students, who are expected to number more than 200, an alltime high.

In the Education faculty, the 16 Education I students enrolled represent 4 less than last year; Education I A (formerly Teacher Training) has approximately the same enrolment as last year.

The Bachelor of Music students number 22, while conservatory registrations include some 314 students.

"Imagine! Hawaii tomorrow and India Friday", exclaims Chris Cassels (B.A. '65) in a recent letter, written a few hours before she boarded the plane in Vancouver. There a rigorous orientation program had just been completed; it was especially designed to provide young Canadian volunteers with basic information about the language, history, economy and culture of the countries to which they had been assigned. Chris and Gary Evans (B.A. '66), who are Indiabound, are among some three hundred and sixty volunteers from across Canada who will be taking up posts in numerous parts of Asia, Africa, the Caribbean and other areas, under the auspices of Canadian University Service Overseas (CUSO).

During his two-year term overseas, each volunteer serves in his own field—teaching, medicine, nursing, as a lab technician, agriculturist, or social worker (to name but a few) — under local conditions of employment. Volunteers are sent abroad in response to specific

requests for their services from the receiving country.

Brandon College's latest CUSO volunteers follow in the footsteps of such other graduates as: Florence English (Ghana, 1963-65); John Easter (Nigeria, 1963-65); Bill Godolphin (Nigeria, 1964-66); John Sushelnitsky (Tanzania, 1964-66); and Les Johnson, 1965-67, presently serving in India.

The CUSO committee at Brandon College provides a contact for undergraduates, alumni or interested persons in the community. We will be glad to provide application forms and to answer the questions of any who are interested in two years "serving and learning." B.C.S.A. PRESIDENT TO TURKEY

Turkey, the land of the Sultans and the home of a once great empire, is wrapped in a aura of romance and excitement that few other countries could match. Geographically between East and West, Turkey is blessed with many of the features of both worlds. It is far from being a land of milk and honey - in the eastern part especially, living conditions are extremely primitive — but is it a "developing" country with an exciting future. The promise of Turkey's future lies not in the sense of a standard of living as elevated as that in North America but rather in the sense of achieving or developing a healthy pride in nation. This not only involves internal change but also includes winning the respect of her fellows in the community of nations.

Turks take a great pride in the military and with a conscription system more strict than the war-conscious U.S., the army has a far-reaching effect on Turkish life. The army is used to give a minimal education to those who enter illiterate and provides technical training which later is put to good use in civilian life. Perhaps even more important, the army, as a common experience and a meeting ground helps to bind the very real

rural-urban split.

Turkey is on the verge of being "discovered" by tourists. It has all the necessary prerequisites—natural beauty, historical wonders, etc.—and lacks only the facilities that comfort-conscious westerners insist upon. As the site for a learning experience of the nature of the WUS Seminar, few countries could be better. That the trip was the experience of a life time goes without saying. The personal gain has been great, the benefits reaped considerable.
