
Where His At With the 69ers



Enrolment

Full course enrolment in the day division at Brandon University this year is 1235 as compared with 1017 last year, 695 in 1965 and 374 in 1960. The increase over last year is 21.4 per cent. In nine years enrolment has more than trebled.

The enrolment in the arts and science faculties is 830 as compared with 736 last year. In addition there are 128 in the new bachelor of teaching programme, all of whom being in their first year are in the arts and science faculties. There are 239 registered in other programmes of the faculty of education bringing the total of students associated with the education faculty to 367 as compared to 254 last year.

Chemistry



Peter Letkeman, B.Sc. (Hons.), U. of M. 1960 and M.Sc., U. of M. 1961 met the degree of Doctor of Philosophy this September in the Faculty of Graduate Studies at Manitoba, and formally received his Ph.D. on October 23, 1969. Dr. Letkeman has been in Brandon since 1961 when he arrived here to teach High School science for two years. He came to Brandon University's Chemistry Department on part-time in 1962 and fulltime in 1963 and is now Assistant Professor of Chemistry. He will be leaving on a Post-doctoral research appointment at University of California, Riverside on January 1, 1970.

His graduate studies have included chemical thermodynamics, advanced inorganic chemistry, quantum chechanics, statistical thermodynamics, advanced analytical chemistry, and radiofrequency and microwave spectroscopy.

His research has been in Polarographic and Nuclear Magnetic Resonance Studies of some Metal — Aminopolycarboxylic Acid Complexes.

The abstract is as follows:

"The polarography of cadmium and lead complexes of diethylenetriaminepentaacetic acid has been studied in an aqueous medium from pH = 2.00 to 9.00 at 25.0° C and with an ionic strength of 0.20 M. Three distinct types of polarographic behavior were noted as the pH range was spanned. The first wave (Wave A) was reversible i.e. the reduction of the free metal, and was kinetically controlled when its height was small (i χ <1.0 μ A) compared to the overall reduction

wave height. The second wave (Wave B) was irreversible, not diffusion controlled but kinetically controlled, as indicated by temperature and pressure studies. The third wave (Wave C) was also irreversible and kinetically controlled. Mechanisms were postulated for all three reduction waves. The individual rate constants for the various mechanisms have been calculated. The stability constants for the various metal complexes were calculated from E_{1/2} data and are summarized below:

A nuclear magnetic resonance study of both Cd-DTPA and Pb-DTPA was also undertaken. These studies were carried out in an aqueous medium from pH = 2.00 to 10.00 at 0.38, and 72°C with an ionic strength of approximately 2.5 M. The protonation of both metal complexes was studied and structures were postulated From the N.M.R. data, the for each. relative life-time was estimated for an individual metal-ligand bond. Both investigations indicated that the protonated complexes play an important role in the co-ordination chemistry of metal-DTPA chelates.

Dr. Letkeman will be engaged in a research project, under the direction of Dr. D. T. Sawyer, involving the stability and stereochemistry of metal (Fe, Mo) complexes of riboflavin in non-aqueous media. The investigation will include electrochemical and N.M.R. methods.

W. L. Morton will be the chairman of Brandon University 1970 Midwinter Seminar on the theme "Manitoba in the New Century". Author of "Manitoba: A History", "The Progressive Party in Canada", "The Canadian Identity" and other works, chairman for 14 years of the history department of the University of Manitoba, member of the Royal Society of Canada, he is master of Champlain College, Trent University, Peterborough, Ont. and professor of history.

A native of Gladstone, Man., Prof. Morton holds three degrees from Oxford University where he was a Manitoba Rhodes scholar, and honorary doctoral

degrees from Toronto University and the University of New Brunswick. He is not a stranger to Brandon, having been assistant professor of history, Brandon College, 1940-42. In 1958 the Royal Society of Canada awarded him the Tyrell medal for Canadian history. He was the editor of "The Voice of Dafoe" published in 1945 and "The Red River Journal of Alexander Begg and Other Documents of the Red River Resistance", 1956. He is the executive editor of "The Canadian Centenary Series: A History of Canada". His "Kingdom of Canada" was published in 1963 and "The Critical Years" in 1965.



BOBCATS 54 — CAMROSE 0

The Bobcats took on Camrose Luthern College from Alberta in their opener at Kinsmen Stadium and completely controlled the contest to win 54-0. Rooke Jim Brown from Killarney, Lagimodiere and Bauman each scored twice with single touchdowns going to Garry Smith on an interception and by George Kunyckyj. A lively crowd of 1400 watched the blue and gold start the season in impressive fashion.

BOBCATS 18 - ROCKY MOUNTAIN 48

A chartered Viscount aircraft took the Bobcats to Billings, Montana to play the powerful Rocky Mountain College Bears. Tough opposition, a field temperature of 85°, an altitude of 3500 feet, and a rash of penalties all combined to add up to a 48-18 defeat of the Bobcats. Quarterback George Kunyckyj scored twice on sneaks, and fullback Jim Wilton got the other Brandon major. Mike Stinchcombe played an outstanding two way game for a losing cause.





BOBCATS 14 - MINOT STATE 14

The Bobcats came up with a great team effort at Minot to tie the Beavers 14-14. Garry Smith opened the scoring with two field goals in the first quarter, one from 40 yards and the other from 18 yards to give the Bobcats a 6-0 lead. Two converted touchdowns in the second quarter, however, put the home team ahead 14-6, at the half.
