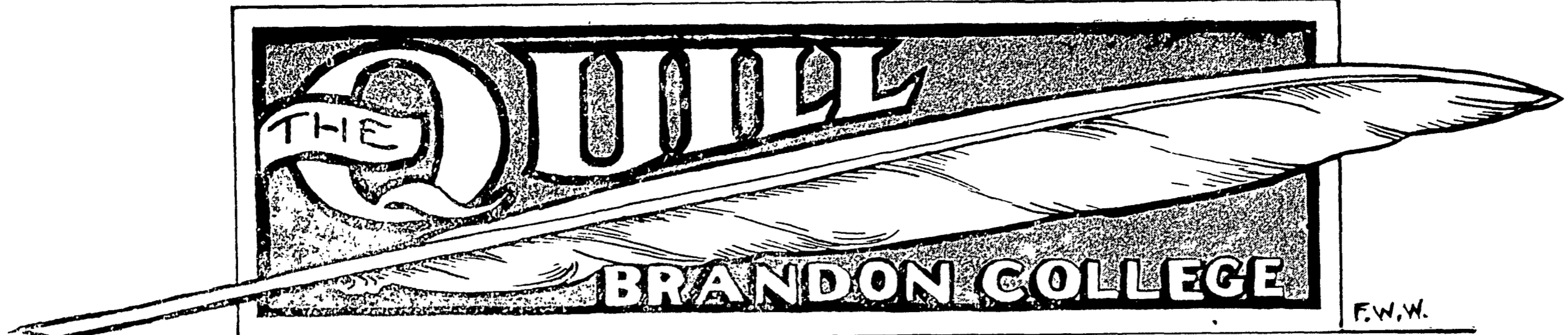

"CAPPY RICKS" SCORES HIT

Startling Success Achieved by Cast as Two Excellent Performances Given in City Hall Proceeds Given to City Relief Fund.

Good entertainment was the keynote of the production of "Cappy Ricks" at the City Hall on December 8th and 9th. Even the highbrows dropped their masks long enough to thoroughly enjoy every moment of this pleasing play. Choosing a play is a difficult task, for not only have those bothersome questions of staging and costuming to be considered, but also the obstacle of royalty has to be overcome. Those responsible for the choosing of "Cappy Ricks" are to be congratulated on obtaining a good snappy play with plenty of action and humor. It was real entertainment for young and old.

A Strong Cast.

The central character was that of "Cappy Ricks" a self-made man of sixty who never admitted defeat. A heavy part and especially difficult for a young man to sustain, but it was a treat to watch George McGregor carry it through. Careful work and a real sympathy with the character marked George's acting, and it would have taken a very much older and more experienced actor to have brought more out of the role.

As "Cappy's" daughter, with something of the old man's spirit, Doreen McGuinness gave the most artistic and finished performance of the entire cast. Whether pleading for the African Pygmy's Uplift Society, or for recognition of her love, she was always convincing and very easy to look at.

Captain Matt Peasley, the adventurous Jack Tar who went into business for himself, was well sustained by Hugh Kennedy. Not too happily casted and somewhat lacking in ex-

perience Hugh nevertheless outdid himself and gave a solid account of the young business man, lover and adventurer.

"Skinner", Cappy's shadow and secretary, was interpreted by Lorne Umphrey, who made a typical 'Yes' man. Cecil Pericles Bernhard, the result of a ten thousand dollar education impressed on a ten cent mind, was in the capable hands of Bob Howland. Bob gave a delightful 'odor' to the performance and provided many laughs. Wilton Fraser made an efficient lawyer, in his small but essential part.

Sheila Nixon appeared as 'Cappy's' sister and succeeded in looking a lovable old maid; her acting carried dignity and conviction. As 'Goldie Glake' the chorus-girl-steno Edna Laycock was very pleasing and one could hardly blame Cecil Pericles for falling in love with her. We must not forget to mention Keith McKinnon who was on the receiving end of a book, and who was the nattiest chauffeur in town.

Production Well Staged.

The stage settings deserve special mention, they were outstandingly good. The office scene was convincing, to the last detail, while the exterior was a triumph of artistic beauty. Few amateur productions have been more adequately staged than was "Cappy Ricks."

The entire play was marked by its smoothness and finish showing careful work, by a live organization, under a capable director. The strength of the individual characters, the deft touches in the "business" and the excellence of interpretation revealed, was a tribute to the qualities of Miss Marjory MacKenzie as a producer.

The "Special Features" Added

An orchestra under the direction of Doris Lintz added to the evening's enjoyment. Edgar Bailey bridged the gap between first and second acts with a rendering of Deems Taylor's modern classic, "Captain Stratton's Faney". The next interval was brightened by the appearance of three modern "Little Maids from School" in the persons of Ethel Brownell, Doris Mills, and Dilys Davies. Shirley Reisberry and Ruth Morgan were the respective accompanists.

The honor of choosing a Queen for the play was won by Arts IV, which was charmingly represented by Dorothy Webb.
