Another successful Field Day was run off yesterday at the Exhibition Grounds. As last year, the meet was closed. The competition was keen and the small crowd got a large order of excitement for their kopecks. There were no entries in the Junior events and no records were shattered despite the fact that a husky breeze favored the shorter runs.

Geo. Thorman (the reticent one) tied up the Grand Aggregate with a total of 31 points. He was given a stiff battle by Einar Egilsson of Junior Hockey fame who fell short of Thorman's total by 2 points. Egilsson lifted the Freshman Medal while Chas. Campbell came 3rd with 22 points.

For the ladies, Polly Pattison, runner-up last year, annexed a total of 30 points to take the Ladies' Grand Aggregate. The Frosette Medal goes to Irene Bowman with 18 points.

A weird feature was produced when Chas. Campbell took the running high jump with 4ft. 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ in. Egilsson and Ben- nest tied for second, cleared 5ft. in the jump-off.

Thorman began well, taking the "100"- "220"- "440" and Half Mile. He faded badly in the mile which "Chubby" Ansloy won easily.

The events were run off in snappy fashion, the track and field committee being ably assisted by Doc Creasy, Eric Barnes, and W. Percival Harwood. Among the interested spectators was Art Brown, twice Champ. and last year runner-up. This was the first College meet in 7 years that has seen Art on the side-lines. The ribbons and medals will be awarded tonight in the Chapel in connection with the Freshmen Lit.
