The serious part of the evening was devoted to a debate "Resolved that Business Depressions are Inevitable under Existing Capitalistic System." The affirmative team, representing the College was George Thorman and Neda Bowman. The Collegiate team was Bill Cross and Earl Mills. The affirmative team stressed the selfish inefficiency of capitalism, leading to over-production, unemployment, and, finally, to the inevitable depressions. The negative team sought to break down the argument by showing that the ills of capitalism are from abuse, and over-use, rather than from the nature of the system. Both teams were thoroughly prepared, experienced debaters, and they afforded real interest to a record crowd for a debate. The decision was awarded to the College.
