COLLEGE FIELD DAY TO BE DROPPED

MONSTER SPORTS DAY PLANNED FOR THURSDAY

At a meeting of the Main Executive Monday afternoon, the Presidents of the Athletics Associations proposed that a Campus Sports Day be substituted for the annual College Field Day. It was pointed out that Field Day in the last two or three years had not been as successful as might be desired and both Miss Pattison and Mr. Morison felt that an all-College sports day held on the campus and embracing all manner of sports and games, would make possible the participation of the entire student body. After considerable discussion, the proposal was enthusiastically endorsed by the meeting. The Athletic Executives are to be in entire charge of the program. Tentative plans, comprising an all-day program include Football, Dodge-ball, Tennis and Softball games, as well as a schedule of various kinds of races and contests including events in which every student, not to mention the members of the Faculty, may strive against his fellows. The entire day will witness a titanic struggle between the Junior and Senior Arts, as it is understood that all events will be contested by representatives of Junior and Senior Arts respectively. The trophy that was formerly awarded to the winning Arts on Field Day, will again be the prize of victory and will be presented to the executive of either Junior or Senior Arts at the first Lit. following the Campus Sports Day.

Weather permitting, supper on the campus will follow this day of gala sport, and a bonfire in the evening will be the grand finale of what promises to be a red letter day in the list of our fall activities.
