For the enlightenment of all who at present remain blissfully ignorant concerning how to vote, we print the following instructions to voters:

1. In the case where there are only two candidates for an office, the elector will mark an "X" after the candidate of his choice.

2. In the case where there are more than two candidates for an office, the elector will mark 1, 2, 3, etc., after the candidates' names in the order of his choice. The order of choice of all candidates must be signified.

3. No other marks shall be put on any ballot.

If the ballots are marked according to the above instructions, there will not be the large number of spoiled ballots to be cancelled, as was the case in last year's election. Be sure to vote; and be sure to vote carefully, following the above instructions.

BURNESKI ADDRESSES SCIENTISTS CLUB

At the first meeting of the Science Club for 1936, A. D. Burneski in the capacity of radio specialist, gave a very enlightened paper on "Cathode Rays," using the oscilloscope to demonstrate his remarks. Frank Meadows of Amateur Radio Station VE4-AC co-operated by transmitting various types of emissions, such as carrier waves, modulated carrier, etc. The Oscilloscope may be regarded as one of the most potential instruments in the hands of the experimenter both in fields of electricity and mechanics. With it, it is possible to interpret and visualize electrical phenomena and wave forms. The meeting closed with a lively discussion and a greater appreciation and understanding of the possibilities to be gained in this branch of Science.

EDITORIAL

UNDERGRADUATES—INTELLECTUAL SNOBS

There comes a time in the affairs of students when certain things can no longer be borne passively and tolerantly and such a time is now when it is no longer possible to suffer the snobbish undergraduates whose world is contained within the college and who divide people into two sets; those who have been to college and those who have not. We have no intentions of deprecating the advantages of a college education, which even the most obtuse can realize or of underestimating the value of college spirit, but to point out that many students attach too much importance to the mere fact that they go to college and that the same students often mistake college spirit for a narrow viewpoint focussed only on affairs within college walls.

Men students are less at fault in this respect than, in this case, their inferior sisters. The majority are at least, informed of what is going on in the world outside the college and they do not stigmatize those who have not had the advantages of a college education.

If students would realize that there are many reasons other than lack of intelligence or desire, for their brothers and sisters failing to go to college, and that they have much to learn from non-college students, and if they would realize that the fact that one has been to college does not give a premium to knowledge, wisdom or morality, they would be less snobbish of non-college people. Knowledge received at college is one of theory, it is not one of practice nor is it wisdom. It gives a certain amount of knowledge which would be acquired with some pain in experience. The average college student makes a third class standing in his subjects, representing 60 percent of what has been taught him. When the student realizes that in his study he has only skimmed on the surface of his subject and has read about three books on the subject, when thousands of books have been written on it, he will perhaps see that there is still a great deal for him to know.

As long as we hear co-eds attempting to insult other girls with the remark that they have never gone to college, telling bar-room jokes, ruining a chapel service for their neighbors by going into details of their adventures of the night before during prayer, as long as we see co-eds reading literature of the true confession type, we will not agree that because they go to college they are in a class above others. As long as we see men students with the manners of a boor, cheating, lying and swearing, we will not agree with them that a B.A. will give a premium on all that is to be admired.

Nor as long as we meet true gentlemen and gentlewomen who have never gone past high school, young people who have never been to a philosophy class, talking with more maturity than special philosophy students and as long as we see men and women who have never been in college halls enjoying the classics and as long as we see young men and women who have never been to a college class assuming positions of regard in social, business and community affairs, we will contend that a college education in itself is not enough to boast of, but what is important is what a student makes of his college education.

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**JACK KEPPEL LEADS SENIORS
TO 37-19 WIN; SISTER DONNA
STARS WHEN GIRLS LOSE**

Over 200 basketball fans, most of them students, turned out to the Y. M.C.A. on Thursday when the Brandon college held its second successful "Booster Night" of the season. Unfortunately, for the students at least, the College seniors were the only team who could score a victory. The College juniors' and girls' quintettes were nosed out by three and one point margins respectively by Eddie Fallis' Collegiate teams. A last minute basket by tall Blanche Benson enabled the high school team to score a 10-9 triumph while 9 points from the accurate-shooting Homer Brown spelled disaster for the gold clad College juniors.

Elongated Jack Keppel, with 14 points, was the leading light in the College's 37-19 win over Aces. Dr. Evans' charges held the upper hand throughout as they flashed a brilliant passing attack and topped it off with accurate shooting. Although without the services of Jim McGregor, the clever guard who is out of competition with a cracked bone in his right ankle the College defence was strong and the Aces found difficulty in penetrating it. Roy Hotson and Jack Benson did the majority of the basket-finding with 7 points each. For College Fraser and Ball followed Keppel with 8 and 7 point totals respectively.

Collegiate Girls 10, College 9
Close checking featured the low-scoring girls game with the outcome always in doubt. The Clark Hall team led at the halfway mark 5-4 on two baskets by Donna Keppel and a free throw by Agnes Bigelow. Mary Zink's basket coupled with free throws by Walchuk and Dietrich accounted for the B.C.I.'s scoring.

Excitement ran high as the teams continued their close play in the second half. Bigelow's basket gave College a three-point lead, but the advantage was short-lived as Benson and Dietrich counted for Collegiate. Successive free throws by Pattison and Heywood once again put the Eighteenth street institution in the lead but Benson's basket just as the final whistle blew decided the issue.

Collegiate Juniors 19, College 16
This contest provided the large gallery with the best basketball of the night. Play was close at all times as both clubs worked a careful man-for-man defence. The Fallis crew jumped into a 6-2 lead early in the game on baskets by Wickett, Brown and Singleton. Two accurate free throws by Bill Reed accounted for College's tallies. Then successive baskets by Robertson and Ostrander gave College an 8-6 advantage but Hummery's field goal and Brown's free throw gave the

B.C.I. team a 9-8 advantage at half-time.

Fleet Homer Brown netted three field goals at very opportune moments in the second half and though College fought back strongly they were unable to overcome their opponents' advantage.

Johnny Millar, Jimmy Casey and John Plum were in charge of the three games and their work left nothing to be desired.—B.F.
