We could go on to mention more, but these should suffice as examples.

Last year, what we hope will be an annual affair was presented in the first CO-ED edition of the Quill. Now, in carrying this forward, we give you the second annual CO-ED Quill.

FEDERAL SCHOLARSHIP GRANT CONSIDERED

A campaign for a Federal Scholarship grant was recently announced by the executive of the Canadian Student Assembly (National student organization growing out of the Winnipeg Conference). Two steps are being taken. First, the local student assemblies of Toronto and Queen's are preparing a brief to be presented early in April to the Commission on Dominion Provincial Relations. This brief will contain material on the following topics: available scholarships, costs of higher education, under-representation of rural students in universities, employability of matriculants, comparison of budget allocations, and the contribution of university graduates to national leadership. "A broad educational campaign with full use of press, literature and speakers" is

the second step, and will go into operation after the presentation of the brief.

The subject of a federal scholarship grant should be of vital concern to all students and young people. The local student assembly executive will meet in room "Q" at 1 p.m., Wednesday, March 16th, to consider what Brandon can do in this matter.

Hitting their true "stride" early in the game, "Gob's Gazules" proceeded to set a pace which was a little too fast for the hard-fighting Wesleyans. Half time found the score 13-7 in the local's favor, a lead which the visiting team was never able to overcome, the standing at the final whistle being 27-17. Scoring 12 of the Collegians total of 27, Vi. Munt lead the procession of point-makers for the Brandonites. Showing much improved form due to faithful training, the Stinson Kirk coached gang gave a pleasing exhibition, engineering many brilliant plays, their rushing and snappy passin being a revelation to the many fans present.

Although accepting defeat, the visitors were always very much in the game, the strange floor no doubt affecting their play to some extent. Kenson was high scorer for Wesley with 9 points to her credit.

MUNT STARS IN WIN OVER WESLEY

The Wesley hoopsters were an easy mark for the Dr. Evans' crew, the game ending with the one-sided score of 29-10.

The Kirk-McGregor line was very effective, not only in blocking the opposing forwards, but on the offensive as well, securing a total of 11 points between them. Harry Ostrander, as high scorer of the game, turned in a nice performance, especially in his scoring of field baskets. While the entire team worked hard and were value for their win, yet they were scarcely up to their standard of effectiveness around the basket, many of their shots failing to click.
