DEAR SIR,

If single lectures are required, please apply direct to the lecturer desired, allowing as much previous notice as possible. The lectures are as a rule given gratuitously, and within reasonable distances no travelling expenses are charged. Those lecturers whose names are marked with a star (*) are willing to speak in the open air. The letter (*a*) prefixed to a name indicates a lecturer willing to speak at Pleasant Sunday Afternoons.

Courses of three, four, and five successive lectures, by different lecturers, on separate aspects or parts of the same subject, are often more popular than isolated lectures. Particulars of suggested courses are given on the next page, and for these application should be made, stating the dates available, to the Secretary of the Fabian Society.

Reading Circles to read and discuss Economic or Historic Works in connection with Socialism can also be arranged in clubs or other centres.

Arrangements have been made for the supply of Lantern Slides illustrating Socialism (including Municipal Developments), which will be lent for lectures at a small charge. We have also a set of slides illustrating a printed lecture entitled "The White Slaves of England." Particulars will be sent on application.

It is requested that, in any published announcement of a lecture, the word "Fabian" be added after the lecturer's name, unless he should express a wish to the contrary; and that full notice of the lectures be given to the local press.
